PAMMEL WOODS PRESERVE

Location. The forty acre area bounded by Hyland Avenue, the Chicago and Northwestern Railway, the golf course and the college cemetery was formerly known as College Park in distinction from North Woods which lay along the course of Squaw Creek. For many years Pammel Woods has served as a field laboratory for observation of native plants and animals by college classes.

A memorial. In 1941, this tract was designated by the Board of Education as a memorial to Dr. L. H. Pammel and the area was formally dedicated on June 7, 1941.

Name. Though the name applied to the tract by the Board of Education was Pammel Park, it was thought by George Godfrey, former chairman of the College Wildlife Committee, that <u>Pammel Woods</u> would serve as a simple descriptive name which would also distinguish the local area from Pammel Park in Madison County.

Need of marker. It seems fitting that Pammel Woods like the other memorials should have a marker of similar type so that persons who approach it may know that it is a Memorial Preserve. To realize that the area is a preserve should motivate its protection. Some recently set up markers bearing the caption Plant Preserve, No Trespassing convey the wrong impression and should be replaced. The posts, which bear the signs, appear substantial and adequate. The public should not be excluded but invited to contemplate the area as a specimen of native woodland and their cooperation should be solicited in its protection.

Need for Restoration of Pammel Woods. As late as 1920, little erosion had marred the course of Clear Creek which runs through Pammel Woods. A border of willows helped to maintain the boundaries of its bank, but these have matured and disappeared. A period of severe storms resulted in washing of banks and

fallen trees have impounded waters which in some measure have changed the course of the stream. The same storms accelerated the erosion of the ravine at the entrance of the woods near the east side of the cemetery.

About 1904, a beautiful hard surfaced entrance near the cemetery led down the narrow valley and bordered the eastern chain of hills along Clear Creek forming a terrace above the floodplain. The path, constructed of soil reinforced with brick fragments, still persists along the north side of the hill opposite the railroad track. These bricks and some of the underlying rock came from the dismantling of the Old Main Building. The eroding ditch at the entrance of the woods between the cemetery and golf course is now a dump heap for the golf course where brush, tin cans, paper, bottles and other debris are accumulating. The course of the stream could be controlled by further planting of willows. The gully erosion could also be overcome by methods for which Iowa State College has expert consultants. This potentially beautiful memorial so fittingly established could be made an asset to scientific study, a source of inspiration to the local resident and to many returning alumni who from time to time renew their impressions of a once familiar spot.


