UNITED WAR WORK FUND CAMPAIGN.

Figure 1 Towa State College is expected to subscribe \$23,500 in the United War Work Fund Campaign. Such an amount was actually contributed a year ago to the war work fund of two organizations along, the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A.

The campaign executive committee in this College believes that at least \$10,000 of this amount should be subscribed by faculty and extension men and women and other employes of the College. A year ago they actually contributed in excess of \$11,000 or an average of \$36,00. The students of the College are volunteering to subscribe at least \$13,500.

You, of course, want to do your full share in support of the splendid work of the sevenagencies that are united in this campaign. You also want every other member of the faculty to do his full share. There is only one way to make sure of a fair distribution of the load and that is by following an apportionment plan. Such a plan, worked out on a salary basis, was approved by a large and representative meeting of faculty men and women.

Therefore, the faculty members of the executive committee are suggesting to all faculty members the subscription of definite sums that seem just. They ask that you subscribe at least \$20.00 and that you call at the Treasurer's office, Central Building, sometime between 8 o'clock a.m. and 6 o'clock p.m. Monday Movember 11, and close up the matter. You may pay cash in full, if you desire, or you may arrange for deferred pauments. If the request for the above sum is unfair, you may adjust the matter with the committee, which will sit in Room 101, Central Building, for the purpose, all day Monday.

You know how essential the work of the Y.M.C.A., the Y.W.C.A., the K.C., the Salvation Army, the American Library Association, the Jewish Welfare Board and the War Camp Community Service has been in contributing cheer and comfort to our fighting men and in making morale. Altho peace may seem near, the work of these seven great organizations is by no means near an end. It is certain to take many months after the conclusion of peace, to demobolize our army and navy and in that long waifing period the soldier and sailor will have even greater need of the ministrations of these organizations. This is no time to think of quitting our helpfulness to our soldiers, even the the enemy is quitting its fighting.

Kindly take care of this matter as a patriotic duty and help Iowa State College maintain its high standard of loyalty and sacrifice.
