CONTRACTOR ARRIVES
Bill Branson, superintendent for B & A Construction Company, Fairbanks, reached Valdez last night. Three other members of his crew were with him and material and equipment will follow. He said that three backhoes with fork lifts, two or three pickups and a truck would be arriving this week.

B & A Construction will have headquarters at 316 Hobart St. (Walker residence) while here. The Walkers will be moving into the Cox house shortly.

BUILDING MATERIALS
Valdez will be enriched with a gift of 315 ton of building materials from the Alaskaid ship load of lumber from the West Coast. The lumber, along with 5,000 lbs of cheese from Tillamook, Oregon, arrived in Alaska the first part of May.

The Valdez portion is due to leave Seward this week by barge or steamship for Valdez, it was announced by Acting Mayor Jim Bedingfield at the Monday night council meeting

Volunteer labor will be donated by qualified long shoremen to help unload the lumber, Bill Pettit explained. Herman Sontag has offerred equipment for this purpose.

Jack Brandis, Willamette Valley lumberman who served as chairman for Alaskaid, visited Valdez briefly at the time the ship load of lumber reached Alaska the first part of May.

## PUBLIC MEETING SCHEDULED TONIGHT IN VALDEZ

A general, public review of the over-all planning for Valdez from a funding, programming and timing standpoint may take place in Valdez tonight.

Dwight A. Ink, Executive Director of the Alaska Reconstruction Commission, with Wilmont L. Averill, his executive officer, are expected to arrive in Valdez this morning along with Vic Fischer, Assistant Administratot of the Housing and Home Finance Agency, Washington, D.C., and others.

The Mineral Creek townsite of the New Valdez may well become a national showplace with the type of city planning that is now taking place. Paul Finfer of City Planning Associates, explained to the business community last night that a group of thenation's top architects had been retained by the Anderson Committee

to "look over the shoulder" of his firm and the Alaska State Housing Authority to VALDEZ TODAY due to weathermake sure that a pearl of a city develops.

In addition, Finfer said, the group was so impressed with Valdez that it had decided to "adopt" Valdez in some manner, in regards to architectural planning.

It is not known in just what way this will develop, but Finfer felt that Valdez was indeed fortunate to have men of such renown in their field take such a deep interest in Our Town.

Business Section Finfer felt that elements WILL BE A VERY SHORT NOTICE of the central business area could include a community shopping center, a town square, city hall facilities, one or two churchwhatever family type mobile es, a social or cultural center with movie house, gas stations (close to the main highway artery), motels or hotels, fire house, a fine restaurant, proff-esional office facilities for lawyers, etc., and a bowling center, and bars.

He felt that the business section should have round the clock activity.

Finfer pointed out that Valdez enjoys a situation that very few communities ever have - the chance to start anew, using the very latest thinking and experience of the entire nation and the world.

Architecture An Alaskan architecture, suggestive of the very ruggedness of Alaska, could be developed, the planner thought, that would be at home with the Valdez picturesque setting.
