Local men interested in working on this job may apply at 218 Hobart Street, beginning Wednesday, June 24th, Carroll said. B & A will have their own application forms here. Work should start soon after.

FINAL PLANNING FOR VALDEZ READIED

OMNIBUS BILL PROGRESS REPORTED BY REP. RIVERS

Washington, June 18 -Special to the Valdez Bugle -From Office of Ralph J. Rivers:

"We are pleased to report that the House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs today approved the Omnibus Bill requested by the Administration and introduced in the House by Rep. Ralph Rivers (D-Alaska) to provide augmented federal assistance for the reconstruction of areas damaged by the Good Friday earthquake and resultant seismic waves.

Although the Bill was designed to authorize more liberal assistance than is allowed by existing law, the committee proceedings led to introduction of five Amendments by Representative Rivers. The Rivers Amendments (to give greater flexibility and generosity than provided in the Bill as drafted) were opposed by the Bureau of the Budget through a letter placed on the desk of every member of the committee.

In the course of processing these amendments, all but one was approved by the Committee in whole or in part. The first amendment approved by the committee would increase the Federal Government's maximum share of the cost of Urban Renewal projects from seventy-five percent to ninety percentwith a proportionate reduction of the cost to local governments in the disaster area. The amendment is general in its application and does not exclude Anchorage.

The second Rivers Amendment, as approved by the committee, refers to the purchase of State Bonds issued in connection with the Disaster, and provides that the Federal Government may purchase such bonds up to 25 million dollars worth at an interest rate of 3% instead of at an interest rate of three and three-fourths percent.

The next Rivers Amendment authorizes the Federal Government to purchase State Bonds which were scheduled for issuance before the quake up to an amount of seven million two hundred thousand dollars (\$7,200,000) needed to carry on the State's capital improvement program.

The last amendment offered by Rivers and appropri by the Committee would authorize the Federal National Mortgage Association to repurchase any home mortgage insured by FHA and secured by property in Alaska destroyed or severely damaged in the quake or resulting seismic waves. The Amendment also authorizes the use of not to exceed 10 million dollars in Federal National Mortgage Association Special Assistance Funds for such repurchase

In commenting upon his gratification at the action taken, Rivers expressed his appreciation of the fine cooperation of Chairman Wayne Aspinall and all his women of Valdez, the B ugle colleagues on the committee, and said, "I sincerely hope thank's the Lovable Company that the gains made for Alaskans through my amendments for this useful yet highly will be sustained on the Floor of the House and by the Senate."

Action by the full House of Representatives is expected in about a week.

CAPTAIN TOM BAKER of the Yukon Aviation Ba., Fort Wainwright, returned to Valdez June 1, for a second glimpse of the spectacular mountain and waterfront scenery.
