April's weather was near normal but May was very wet.

It rained three and four days a week, many times very heavy.

At this writing many fields are waiting to be planted or planted again.

In general we felt bird population was very good. In fact, Layton's and we cautiously say the population is up. Their banding operation, always in the same place and total hours run nearly the same, has yielded five hundred more total birds than last year, a nearly twenty per cent increase. In fact, the prime week in May it rained almost constantly and we were severely hampered.

General comments are on the enclosed card. The following comments are the more rarer sightings.

Hawk numbers seem very poor as stated. At our Iowa
Ornithologists Union meeting of two days and one hundred and
fifty observers, the only birds of prey seen were Turkey Vulture
and Red-Tailed Hawk.

Great Horned Owls seem to have a good nesting season, for the two nests under observation fledged two young each, and many others were seen. For the third time in the past six years Barred Owls have nested at the corner of College Street and North E Street in Oskaloosa in large Soft Maple trees.

This was known because each time a young owl was found on the ground following a storm, and the adults were always present. These youngsters were always successfully raised by Layton's, banded, and released. Not an everyday occurance, I'm sure.

A Chucks-Wills-Widow was heard calling near the Des Moines River on May 25th. This had always been ideal Whip-Poor-Will habitat, and when a lady living near there reported to Layton's she had a funny sounding whip-Poor-Will and when they investigated they found the Chuck's. This was three years ago, and they have been there since, and have been banded there has well has near ottumwa by the Ayres and the Layton's. Area birders agree the bird is extending it's range into southern Iowa.

Red-Headed Woodpeckers are again very common in Iowa this spring. We are very fortunate.

Bluebirds are still few and far between, but many more are reported thirty miles to the south.

Purple Finches and Pine Siskins were very common at our feeder in April. It was only a few years ago that Purple Finches were unheard of in Uskaloosa.

migration for us. Two appeared at our feeder April 2, peaking at nine April 6, and the last two seen April 26. According to Woody Brown's book, An Annotated List of the Birds of Iowa, the latest record for Iowa was March 6, 1966. Whether this will be a new Iowa record remains to be seen. Four of these were banded by Layton's. The males were all first year breeding males according to Robert's Manual.

All of these observations were jointly made by the Layton's and we and are reported with their permission. Good Birding!
