This will give us two full days with two evenings in camp and we have made arrangements to have an evening of pictures of Our Common Birds. slides are made from photographs of birds at home, taken by Dr. A. A. Allen of Cornell University, Editor of the Childrens' Department of Bird-Lore. They are unusual and well worth seeing, and are loaned by the courtesy of the Extension Division of Iowa University.

It is hoped to secure a speaker for the second evening, but we are

not able to make a definite announcement at this time. We hope that every member in Ames, Des Moines and Boone, as well as all members in this part of the state, will attend this meeting at the Ledges. The expense will be \$1.50 a day for board, lodging and program. Please make your reservations early with Mr. Carl Fritz Henning of Boone, who will be in touch with the Nelsons at the Camp.

Those of you who can not go to McGregor be sure to go to the Ledges -- but be sure to go to one place and let us have a good time

together.
