This was a fun and exciting spring. Though my total species count is down from previous years - due more to work schedule than anything else - I was able to find some good birds, especially in late May. My nemesis bird, the American Avocet turned into my 300 Iowa Life bird!

I see that I have several early and late dates. These include Osprey, American Avocet, Palm and Wilson's Warbler. The way the spring turned out I am not to surprised about the late dates. I expect more late dates will be set once the summer reports come in.

The Osprey was at the Blackhawk Wildlife Area in Sac County on March 14. The bird flew directly overhead at an estimated 30 - 40 feet. The distinguishing characteristics were the white above and below the eye with a brown streak through the eye, whitish body and brown wings. I have seen this bird many times before in migration and feel confident that this was an Osprey.

The Avocet was also at the Blackhawk Wildlife Area in Sac County on May 30 This large shorebird had a distinctly straight bill (slightly upcurved at the end of the bill), in comparison to the one I observed a week earlier. The bird was in full sun light and was beautiful. The head and neck were a rich cinnamon color, while the wings were black with the bold white stripe through the middle. The rest of the body was white.

The Palm Warbler was at Moorehead Park and in the company of other early warblers, i.e., Yellow Rumped and Orange Crowned. The bird had a distinctly yellowish plumage with a rich brown crown, yellow eyebrow, streaked chest, yellowish rump, the bird also bobbed its tail while it was perched.

The Wilson's Warblers were in Lake View near the Stubbs nature trail. The birds were all males with a greenish back, yellowish body and a distinctive black cap.

I hope these details are enough to confirm the identification of these species. I hope to see you around. Keep up the **great** job on the field reports. I really enjoy the format and appreciate all the time and effort you put into it.
