MA2, Malvern, Iowa. Aug 11.



Dear Vern,

Hope I make the deadline. Summer is real busy here on the farm. Managed to do a BBS at Neola, Iowa and a Fremont Co check for breeding birds (June 2 and 5 respectively).

Least Bittern: One seen flying over cattails at Forney Lake.
Presumably breeds.

Solitary Sandpiper: First one seen July 16.

Cuckoos: YB common here, but arrived late this year. Ratio of YB to BB 8:2 June 5 in Fremont Co.

Western Kingbird: Fairly common breeder, especially on Missouri R. bottoms. One also found on Neela BBS.

Least Flycatcher: Heard on two separate occasions in same area on Mo. R. bottoms June 5, but was unable to see bird in act of singing (Traix Willow was also in area). Will check this next year. Fremont Co is within the range outlined in AOU but is considered a rare breeder in Iowa (Brow n).

Tufted Titmouse: Common breeder in larger wooded tracts (Manti Woods, Waubonsie S.P.) but very scarce elsewheere.

Loggerhead Shrike: Fairly common breeder: 2 found June 5 in Fremont Co and but none on Neola BBS.

Bell's Vireo: Not hard to find in bottomland riparian habitats: 3 found June 5 in Fremont Co.

Ovenbird: 3 singing (one seen) Waubonsie SP June 5.

Louisiana Waterthrush: One singing strongly in perfect habitat (wooded ravine with small stream) in Waubonsie SP June 5. Watched at leisure.

Bobolink: Breeds in small numbers here: 5 on Neola BBS

and breeds in Fremont Co, but only one locality known by me. Brown (Annotated List) considers Lamoni unusually far south for this species in

summer.

Orchard Oriole: Unusually common June 5 in Fremont Co; 15 found. Summer Tanager: 2 found at Waubonsie SP June 5, but no Scarlets, despite thorough search.

Rufous-sided Towhee: Locally distributed in Fremont Co. Seems to prefer extensively wooded areas (as for Tufted Titmouse) with open patches within them.

Dickcissel: Abundant this year: exceeded in numbers on Neola BBS only by House Sparrow, Western Meadowlark, and Red-winged Blackbirf!

Lark Sparrow: Breeds in drier or sandier areas in Fremont Co: 3 found June 5 on Mo R bottems.

Vesper Sparrow:

Fremont Co is near the southwest extreme of the breeding range of the eastern subspecies. Easterla ('Checklist of Mo Birds, 1971') considers it a casual SR in nw Mo, and it is listed only as a migrant in 'List of Birds of Fontenelle Forest and Environs', which includes Council Bluffs and adjacent farmland in Iowa, especially the Missouri Friver bottomlands.

This summer I found one on June 5 near the Mo River in Fremont Co and also one on the Neola BBS (about 50 miles further north).

I have one other record: Aug 3, 1975 near Tabot. Iowa.
