I just moved here from Alexandria, VA, and previously lived in PA. In both places, (especially VA) Mockingbirds are quite common in the summer. I don't think I would mistake anything else for a mockingbird. I saw it in flight, so I saw the big white spots on the wings (which I think are the easiest way to identify them). I believe that the Peterson book shows us as being just inside of the northern edge of the mockingbird summer range. I guess those maps are not all that accurate.
