Dear Tom:-

Some details of the species you highlighted are:-

✓ Red-necked Grebe:-

Seen on Sept. 20<sup>th</sup> + 25<sup>th</sup>. one individual with Horned Grebes. Long neck, reddish with white throat. Larger than Horned. Dark crown, no other head markings.  
on ponds at Sanborn

✓ Eared Grebe:-

Seen on Oct 9<sup>th</sup> Two individuals, winter plumage. white spot behind eye. small size. on ponds at Sanborn

✓ Cattle Egret

Seen on Oct 20<sup>th</sup> one individual seen. on edge of pond. traces of color on crown. yellow bill, small size.

✓ Northern Goshawk

Seen on Sept. 11<sup>th</sup>

one seen on snag near Sanborn. Large size. Gray under parts & white stripe from eye backward. Accipiter profile when it flew away.

Merlin.

Two seen on Sept. 7<sup>th</sup> perched on wires.  
Near Sanborn. ~~No~~ No facial patterns, size,  
a little larger than a kestrel. Generally gray  
above, lighter below. Falcon profile when  
flying. No sounds

Gray Partridge.

Common game bird here. I see  
more of these than pheasants. Rusty tail  
when flying. I listen for them. They can  
be heard  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile. Their whistle is  
distinctive.

Buff-breasted Sandpiper

One seen on Sept. 11<sup>th</sup> at the pond here.  
in Sanborn. Distance 15 feet, good light.  
Buff underparts, some eyering, small size.  
At first I thought it was an Upland s.  
but a way too small. Twisting flight when  
flushed. No voice.

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One seen with mighthawks. No spots on  
underwings, but has white in tail. Aug 27<sup>th</sup>  
evening flight. Not common here.

Western Kingbird

Seen on farm near Sanborn on Sept. 2<sup>nd</sup>. Uncommon here, but there are always a few. I look for the Kingbird profile with white outer-lail feathers.

✓ Winter wren

Sanborn 9/26. one individual, after the house wrens have gone, small size & creeping on ground.

Prothonotary Warbler

✓ one seen on 9/11. Not common here, has a yellow head & plain gray wings. Difficult to identify. No voice. Probably migrating.

✓ Snow Bunting.

Four seen on Nov. 6<sup>th</sup>. In good light on the pebbles of the shore at the lake. Strange, but no others around. Usually seen with Horned Larks.
