Dear Dr. Halmi,

A few notes for your Iowa Birdlife Report. Following are partial list of birds that have increased in population this year in our grea, Jasper County: Eastern Kingbirds, American Robins, American Kestrals, Eastern Kingbirds, Dickcissels and Eastern Meadowlark. In great decrease in this area this year.... all species of warblers. We rarely see a hawk theseedays. Out of seven trips to RedRock Lake I spotted a Red-Tail Hawk once, and am still watching for the Ruby-Throated Hummingbird that was so plentiful last year. One male did show up the 20th of May stopping to take some sips of wife's salvias --- and was seen no more. Mentioning this visit to others, was told by two people they also had a one-time visit by one bird about the same time---very likely the same bird ? I still keep vigil several times a week checking peoples' flower gardens for the hummer. So far zero !

From my note book from Jasper County of birds that con be counted on one hands -- Blubirds 4, Indigo Bunting 2, Bobolinks 3, Green Heron 1, Great Blue Heron 6, Great Horhed Owls 5, one pair of Barred Owls raised three young at Mariposa & Park in Jasper County. Rosebreasted Grosbeak 2, Crested Flycatcher 2.

City of Newton has about ten Nighthawks \*\*\* in various parts of the town, one pair hatched two young on the roof of Skiff Memorial Hospital.

This summer was not a good summer for me to do bird watching. I do have more in my note books but it would not give you an accurate figure unless I added them up.

It looks like Edith and I will not get to the convention Cedar Rapids this year. A wedding in Marengo Illinois that Saturday. We feel sorry about that.
