COMMENTS:

This rather sketchy description was accepted after some discussion by the Records Committee. The only real objections were the subjective description of the white band around the facial skin as "too much white around eye and under chin" to be a Glossy Ibis. Location of the sighting was a strongfactor in acceptance of the record.

The mention that the white band went "under the chin" is actually diagnostic in itself of a White-faced Ibis, as the white edging to the gray or blue facial skin (in spring) of Glossy Ibis is not continuous under the base of the bill.

The Records Committee is very appreciateve of your sending this sighting in, as persons such as yourself, who are often in the field, have many opportunities to see unusual birds in Iowa.

The opinions expressed here are based on the information available to the Committee and should not necessarily preclude an alternate interpretation by those who observed the bird firsthand.

Any action may be re-reviewed upon submission of additional evidence.

Explanation of Classification:

- I = labeled, diagnostic specimen, photograph, or recording available for review by the Committee
- II = acceptable sight record documented independently by 3 or more observers
- III = acceptable sight record documented by 1 or 2 observers
- IV = probably correct record, but not beyond doubt V = record with insufficient evidence to judge
- VI = probably incorrect identification, escapee, or otherwise unacceptable record

Classification is based on the highest category agreed upon by six of seven committee members.
