Fall sighting-no identifying characters. Apparent Plegadis sp. NOTE from Mike Newlon 1981:

The more I research the less I can find about specific distinctions between immature ibeses, as most of the specimens seem to be. Cramp et al. (Handbook of the Birds of the W. Palearctic, v. 1) state that imm. P. chihi is paler on upper parts than P. falasillis. Such plates/photos as I have tend to confirm this (cf. Palmer or new Peterson vs. Pough Waterbirds) but I don't believe that without a series of specimens it's safe to use this. On this basis the mounted specimen in McBride Hall might be a glossy. Does ISU have specimens.? There appears to be no good mensural characteristics (Coues 1872 Handbook of N. Am. Birds). Few of the documentations seem sufficiently good for specific identification (except for the record I-P). NB: P. Chihi has legs as well as facial skin pinkish-red when in high breeding condition, though few/none mention leg color. This is well shown in the photos of ibeses in the new Audubon Soc Fld Guides.
