Mark Lenz, who's sightings I've reported several times through the years, found what he believes to be a White-tailed Kite on May 30 at Algona. Heading home from church, Mark spotted a strange bird perched on a powerline over the Des Moines River on the west side of town. He stopped and got out to view the bird without binocs. It was a small hawk that was white below. It had dark colored shoulders. He believed it was a Mississippi Kite from memory of his Clark and Wheeler. The bird didn't fly and Mark eventually left. Upon returning home, he found that White-shouldered Kite was the bird that matched his sighting. He tried to contact me, but I wasn't in town. I suggested writing up some documentation, but he never did.
