Dear Editor,

Below is my contribution to the spring season 1991 report. This was my first midwest May experience and I was surprised by how consistently diverse a day's list could be.

A fall-out of <u>Vermivora</u> warblers followed a cool front 3-5 May when temperatures dropped to the low 40s. I was out daily in the Iowa City/Hickory Hill Park area 12-19 May. Winds were warm and southerly, and skies cloudy with occasional light rains. Nocturnal passerine migrants seemed to peak in abundance there 12-14 May, when there seemed to be a Tennessee Warbler in every tree singing from dawn to dusk! Migration of these species began to slow significantly by the 19th, and by the 25th the woods were alive with little more than summer residents. This temporal pattern of passerine migration was shifted 5-10 days earlier than I'd expected. The latter half of May was extremely wet with significant flooding along the Cedar and Iowa

I was tied to the VA Hospital in Iowa City through March and April and therefore unable to witness the waterfowl migration. My list reflects mostly residual puddlers in Johnson Co.


