Hi Jim,

Not too much to report. It was a big year for grassland birds. Dickcissels were everywhere by June 1. We found two nexts on Cayler Prairie without any cowbird eggs around the 8th, and when I left on Friday, one chick was hatched out of 4 eggs. Bobolinks, Grasshopper Sparrows, and Sedge Wrens were also numerous. I found a grasshopper sparrow nest on the new addition to Cayler.

On the other hand, wetland birds were way down. We saw about 6 Ruddy Ducks, a cormorant a pair of Redheads, and a Ring-necked duck at Grovers Lake on 6 June. That would be the last we would see of all of those except for a Ring-neck a few weeks later. There were also 2 Gadwall at a small wetland nearby. We barely saw any Blue-winged Teal (only 2 females). Not many coots either.

New true

Forester's and Black Terns were around, but in small numbers. Pelicans were also low--about 25 on Marble Lake.

We did see 4 immature Common Loons on Spirit Lake and one was in Little Miller's bay on 17th (sun was behind the bird, so I only had a sillouette).

Turkey Vultures were apparent for the first time. We saw 4 on the 18th (individually). Also, I heard a field sparrow at Lakeside for the first time on the 16th and we also had a bluebird pair on campus that day. (I had not seen bluebirds near Lakeside since 1986. Nearest field sparrows was always Anderson Prairie in Emmet County.

That's about it.
