Chuck Fuller found this bird and told me about it as we looked at the gulls below the dam.

This was a small, slonder loon with a small dark bill with straight mandibles on the bill. The neck was unpatterned. There was a sharp vertical division on the neck between the light and dark areas. There was still some speckling on its back from its summer plumage. The eye was included in the dark area of the plumage. There was no white area above the eye or in front of the eye. It was dark on the back of neck and top of the head. It had a white throat and inside of the neck. It was diving all the time I was watching.

Similar species and how eliminated: A Common loon is bigger with a big bill, has light areas above and in Front of eye, and a jugged heavily patterned side of the neck, Red-throated born has upturned bill mandibles and the division between dark and light on the neck is not nearly as defined as in a pacific born.
