Deep Description of yellow-throated Warblers  
at White Pine ~~Tree~~ Hollow. May 12, 1980

Approximately 4 singing males of this  
species were heard here singing in White  
Pines. Two of these birds were seen. One  
was seen creeping on branches ~~on~~ near  
the top of a white pine tree about 60 feet  
high. Another was lured down into a  
deciduous tree about 20 feet away by  
a tape recording of its call. ~~was seen~~  
The yellow-throated could be seen and also  
the Bluish gray back and black streaks ~~on~~<sup>on</sup> sides.  
And the white stripe above eye and white ear  
patch could be seen to. It also had a pair  
of white-wing-bars. This is the most ~~northerly~~<sup>northerly</sup>  
location in Iowa that I have heard of.
