

CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNTS GOT UNDERWAY THIS WEEKEND,
AND MOST OF THIS WEEK'S BIRDS WERE DISCOVERED
ON THESE COUNTS.

SECOND STATE RECORD FOR
THE ^AEURASIAN TREE SPARROW NORTH OF BURLINGTON
FIRST REPORTED ON THE 9TH, WERE SEEN ^{AGAIN} ON THE BURLINGTON
COUNT, WITH 15 INDIVIDUALS, 11 OF THEM IN IOWA. TO
LOOK FOR THESE BIRDS GO NORTH FROM BURLINGTON LESS THAN A
MILE ON HIGHWAY #99 AND ^{THEN} GO EAST ON TAMA ROAD. PROCEED
ABOUT 3.2 MILES AND LOOK AT THE FEEDER AND IN A SMALL
FIR TREE IN THE FRONT YARD OF THE STRATTON RESIDENCE
<sup>(BROWN
House)</sup> ON THE WEST SIDE OF THE ROAD. TEN BIRDS WERE SEEN
THESE AND 1 ^{ABOUT A 1 1/4 OF A MILE SOUTH ON} OF THE 64 TOTAL
THE 16TH. OTHER BURLINGTON COUNT BIRDS OF NOTE, A
NORTHERN MOCKINGBIRD, A VESPER SPARROW, 33 GREAT BLUE
HERONS, AND A NORTHERN GOSHAWK IN IOWA.

AT DAVENPORT, APPROXIMATELY 50 SPECIES ON THE
17TH, WITH THE BEST BIRDS 14 WHITE WINGED CROSSBILLS
AT OAKDALE CEMETERY, 1 FIRST WINTER THAYER'S GULL + 2
FIRST WINTER GLAUCOUS GULLS AT LOCK + DAM #15, HERMIT
THRUSH, AND LONG AND SHORT EARED OWLS. THESE HAVE BEEN
NO FURTHER SIGHTINGS OF THE WESTERN GULL OR GREAT
BLACK-BACKED GULL SEEN THESE LAST WEEK.

AT CEDAR RAPIDS, THE BEST BIRDS ON THE COUNT ON THE
16TH WERE WHITE WINGED SCOTER ON THE CEDAR RIVER, A NORTHERN
GOSHAWK, AND PEREGRINE FALCON

IN NEW REPORTS A GOOD PLACE TO VIEW BARN
EAGLES IS THE MISCELLANEOUS WATERFRONT BELOW LYDIA
AT KEOKUK, AS 166 WERE COUNTED ON THE 17TH AND
IN HARDIN COUNTY, A PRAIRIE FALCON, 5 MILES WEST
OF UNION, ALONG COUNTY ROAD D-65 ON THE 19TH.
IN NORTHWEST IOWA SOUTH
OF SIOUX CITY, A TOWNSEND'S SOLITAIRE HAS BEEN
PRESENT FOR OVER A WEEK AT BROWN'S LAKE.

17TH WITH ^{THE BEST BIRDS} CORMORANT BELOW THE DAM IN 2^Q EVENING
CROSBEAKS NEAR A SMALL CEMETERY NORTH OF KNOXON.

AND IN NEW INFORMATION FROM THE CEDAR RAPIDS
^{ON THE 16TH} COURT WHICH SET A RECORD FOR SPECIES, BESIDES
THE WHITE-WINGED SCOTER ON THE CEDAR RIVER AND
NORTHERN GOSHAWK AND PEREGRINE FALCON PREVIOUSLY
REPORTED, THERE WAS A LINCOLN'S SPARROW, 6 WHITE
WINGED CROSSBILLS AT CEDAR MEMORIAL CEMETERY AND AT
CEDAR LAKE, AN OLD RUIN WHICH HAS BEEN THREE 3
WEEKS, RED BREASTED AND HOODED MELAMPHUS AND ONE
BILLED GREBE.

AT IOWA CITY, 63 SPECIES ON THE 16TH, INCLUDING
SOW WHEAT OWL AND REDPOLES AT THE CORALVILLE RES-
ERVOIR AND A RING-NECKED NECKLACE.

TO SOUTH CENTRAL IOWA

AT THE RATHBUN COUNT ON THE 16TH ~~17TH~~
~~CENTER~~ COUNT, APPROXIMATELY 60 SPECIES WITH A
VARIED THRUSH. TO SEE THIS BIRD AT THE HOME OF LORI

SNOW GEESE. ALSO IN NORTHWEST IOWA, 2 NORTHERN
SHRIKES IN SIOUX COUNTY 14 MILES WEST OF SIOUX
CENTER, MERLINS AT THE WEST EDGE OF SIOUX CENTER
AND IN CHEROKEE COUNTY AND 2 BROWN THROATERS AT
SPENCER

IN NORTHEAST IOWA ON THE BREMER COUNTY COUNT
ON THE 16TH, A HARRIER, LONG EARED OWL, 4 PILGRIMED
WOODPECKERS, AND 600 LAPLAND LONGSPURS AND THE CEDAR
FALLS COUNT ON THE 17TH BOTH LONG & SHORT EARED
OWLS, 2 HARRIS' SPARROWS, AND A ^{FEMALE} PINE GROSBEAK
EATING JUNIPER BERRIES AT CEDAR HILLS SAND
PRAIRIE NEAR FINCHFORD.

AT MASON CITY ON THE 16TH, GOOD BIRDS WERE
SHIRE, KINGFISHER, GREAT BLUE HERON, ROBIN, 30 REDPOLES

AT SHELL ROCK PRESERVE, 500 LAPLAND LONGSPURS AND
50 SNOW BUNTINGS; AND A BALD EAGLE. FOR MORE INFO
