

OF THE PAST WEEK
THE WINDY AND WET WEATHER, HAS SLOWED THE
ARRIVAL OF NEW MIGRANTS. TOP BIRDS REPORTED ARE
ROCK WREN, BLACKNECKED STILT + BURROWING OWL IN
THE NORTHWEST AND CINNAMON TEAL, ^{EARLY GREY, AND OLDSWAN} IN THE CENTRAL.

THE BLACK NECKED STILT IN WOODBURY COUNTY WAS STILL
BEING FOUND ON THE 13TH. TO LOOK FOR THIS BIRD FROM
THE SALIX EXIT OF I-29 GO WEST AND FOLLOW THE
SIGN TO SNYDER'S BEND COUNTY PARK. WHEN YOU REACH
THE PARK, DRIVE TO THE FAR OR EAST END OF THE
PARKING LOT. YOU CAN EITHER WALK THE DIRT TRAIL
THROUGH THE TREES OR ALONG THE SHORELINE OF THE OXBOW
FOR NEARLY A HALF MILE. THE STILT HAS BEEN ACROSS
THE OXBOW IN THE AREA WHERE THERE IS AN OPENING
IN THE CATALPA AS WELL AS A SMALL MUD AREA. FOR UPDATES,

TRAP ON THE 13TH WERE MARBLED GODWIT, SANDPELING AND
FORSTER'S TERN. ALSO IN WOODBURY COUNTY, A ROCK
WREN WAS SEEN ON THE 9TH, BUT HAS NOT BEEN RE-
LOCATED. IT WAS AROUND RAILROAD TIES AT THE EDGE OF
A PARKING LOT, WHICH IS BETWEEN THE SIOUX CITY
PRairie AND A BRIAR LIFE COLLEGE DORMITORY.
IN KOSUTH COUNTY, A BURROWING OWL HAS BEEN
SEEN ENTERING A BURROW EVERY DAY SINCE THE 10TH.
HOWEVER, THE FARMER APPARENTLY DOES NOT WANT
BIRDS AT THIS TIME, BUT MAY FEEL DIFFERENTLY
IN A MONTH. WE WILL KEEP YOU POSTED. ALSO IN
KOSUTH COUNTY, A SWAINSON'S HAWK WAS SEEN
SOUTHEAST OF ALBONA ON THE 14TH AND THERE ARE STILL

LARGE FLOCKS OF LONGSPURS.

IN THE CENTRAL, ^{IN} STORY COUNTY
A ^{APPLE} Cinnamon TEAL WAS PRESENT BOTH
THE 13TH AND 14TH IN ONE OF THE COLO PONDS WHICH IS
3 MILES EAST OF COLO ON OLD HIGHWAY 30 THEN NORTH
1/2 TO 3/4 MILES AND LOOK ON THE WEST SIDE OF THE
ROAD. TWO LONG BILLED DOWITCHERS HAVE ALSO BEEN
AT THE COLO PONDS. AT LITTLE WARM LAKE IN
HAMMONTON COUNTY, THERE WERE 3 EARED GREBS AND AN
OLDSQUAW ON THE 10TH. AT THE LEGLER STATE PARK IN
BOONE COUNTY, 3 LOUISIANA WATERTHRUSNES AND A
CAROLINA WREN WERE SPOTTED ON THE 13TH.

IN SOUTHEAST IOWA, AT LOCEY KIOSAUKIA STATE PARK, #
LOUISIANA WATERTHRUSH, 6 YELLOW THROATED WARBLERS
3 PARULA WARBLERS AND A BROAD WINGED HAWK
WERE NOTED AT THE ELY FORD AREA ON THE 12TH. AT
BURLINGTON, AN EARLY WINTER SWIFT AND A PHEASANT
FALCON WERE NORTH OF TOWN ON THE 12TH AND AT
CASS FORD QUARRY SOUTH OF BURLINGTON, COMMON LOON
OSPREY AND WILLET ON THE 14TH. AT CONE MARSH
IN LOUISA COUNTY, A BLACK CROWNED NIGHT HERON ALONG
THE SMALL SOUTH DIKE, ~~AND~~ 50 LESSER GOLDEN PLOVER AND
2 FORSTER'S TERNS ON THE EAST SIDE ON THE 14TH. IN
JOHNSON COUNTY, THE ROSS' GOOSE WAS STILL AT SWAN
LAKE ON ~~THE 13TH~~, A MERLIN WAS AT MALBRIDE
NATURE AREA, AND A NORTHERN MOCKINGBIRD WAS AT
THE WEST OVERLOOK CAMPGROUND OF THE CORALVILLE RES-
ERVOIR ALL ON THE 14TH. WE HAVE HAD NO FURTHER
