~~RECORDED~~ ^{REPORTED} ON SAT SEPT 9 ~~AT~~ ^{2 1/2 MILES} SOUTH OF
BLAIRSTOWN + 1 1/2 MILES NORTH OF THE BENTON-
TOWN COUNTY LINE. THIS IS A DESERT SW-
BIRD NOT SEEN IN TOWNS IN MODERN
TIMES. THE LOCATION WAS DESCRIBED AS
2-3 MILES SOUTH OF BLAIRSTOWN ALONG
COUNTY ROAD V-56 ALONG AN EAST-WEST
STRETCH OF ROAD AT AN ABANDONED
FARMSTEAD OR THE NORTH SIDE OF THE
ROAD.

THE ROYAL TERN NORTH OF BURLINGTON
FIRST REPORTED ON SEPT 6, WAS NOT
SEEN BY A PARTY IN A BOAT WHO
SEARCHED THE AREA FOR SEVERAL HOURS.
HOWEVER, THEY DID FIND 2 LEAVING BIRDS,
1 JUVENILE AND 1 2ND YEAR BIRD, 2
COMMON TERNS, A JUVENILE + AN ADULT +
BLACK + FORSTER'S TERNS. THE ROYAL TERN
WAS LAST SEEN AT 7:00 PM ON THURSDAY
EVENING THE 7TH.

THESE IS A PROBABLE ROYAL TERN IN
SOUTHERN IOWA IN THE MISSISSIPPI RIVER
ABOUT 10 MILES NORTH OF BURLINGTON ^{FOR INFORMATION}
IT WOULD BE A FIRST STATE RECORD IF
ACCEPTED. TO LOOK FOR THE BIRD EXIT
HIGHWAY 99 NORTH OF BURLINGTON BETWEEN
MILE MARKERS 9 & 10 AND GO EAST ON A
GRAVEL. GO A TOTAL OF 5 1/4 MILES, WHICH
INCLUDES A 1 MILE JOG TO THE NORTH
AT THE FIRST INTERSECTION. DRIVE ON TOP
OF THE LEVEE TO A PUBLIC ACCESS + LOOK
AROUND THE SMALL ISLANDS ^{OR ON LOGS OR RACKS} _{IN} THE RIVER.
IT USUALLY IS WITH CASSIAN TERNS.
A SCOPE IS NECESSARY AND A BOAT
WOULD BE BETTER BECAUSE YOU ARE LOOKING
EAST AFTERNOON & EVENINGS ARE BEST.
ALSO, BECAUSE THAT IS WHEN THE TERNS FLOCK IN THAT AREA.

IT APPEARS THAT THE SAVORYVILLE RESERVOIR IN POLK COUNTY WAS THE PLACE TO BE FOR BIRDS THIS PAST LABOR DAY WEEKEND. THAT AND THE CONTINUED PRESENCE OF THE JUVENILE LAUGHING GULL AT RED ROCK RESERVOIR ARE THE WEEK'S HIGHLIGHTS.

ON SUNDAY SEPT 3RD A RED KNOT IN BASIC PLUMAGE WAS FOUND AT THE BEACH AREA OF THE SANDPIPER RECREATION AREA ^{OF THE SAVORYVILLE RESERVOIR} AND ON MONDAY THE 4TH, IT WAS JOINED BY A SECOND KNOT, WHICH APPEARED TO BE AN IMMATURE BIRD. OTHER SHOREBIRDS REPORTED WERE RUDDY TURNSTONE, SANDERLING, BAIRD'S AND WESTERN SANDPIPER. ALSO WHITE PELICANS AND BLACK, CASIAN, AND FORSTED'S TURNS. ON THE 6TH THERE WERE 2 KNOTS, TURNSTONES, AND A LEAST BERNISIN. AT THE OAK GROVE RECREATION AREA OF THE 3RD SANDERLINGS, 1 WHITE PELICAN, AND A BUFF-BREASTED SANDPIPER.

THE JUVENILE LAUGHING GULL, FIRST REPORTED ON AUGUST 19TH, WAS SEEN AT RED ROCK RESERVOIR IN MARION COUNTY ON BOTH AUG 30TH AT THE SWIM BEACH AT THE NORTH END OF THE DAM AND ON SUNDAY SEPT 3RD ON A GRAVEL BAR BELOW THE DAM, THE 2 LOCATIONS THAT IT HAS BEEN FOUND IN THE PAST. ALSO PRESENT AT THE BEACH ON THE 30TH WERE SANDERLINGS AND A LEAST TERN, AND UPSTREAM AT THE RUMBLESS WILDLIFE AREA IN POLK COUNTY AN IMMATURE LITTLE BLUE HERON ON THE 2ND.

IT WAS SEEN AROUND A FEEDLOT ALONG THE
NORTH-SOUTH STRETCH OF ROAD AND ON SUNDAY
IT SAT IN A LOW DEAD TREE 1/2 MILE EAST
OF THE FEEDLOT.</sup>

ALSO IN CENTRAL IOWA, 19 WARBLER SPECIES, INCLUDING GOLDEN-WINGED, CAPE MAY, AND CONNECTOR ALONG THE RACCOON RIVER SOUTH OF PERRY IN DALLAS COUNTY. ON THE 2ND.

IN NORTH CENTRAL IOWA AN ESTIMATED 2000 WHITE PELICANS AT VENTURE MARSH IN CERRO GORDO COUNTY ON THE 1ST.

AND IN SOUTHEAST IOWA AT THE LARAVILLE RESERVOIR IN JEFFERSON COUNTY, A RED-SHOULDERED HAWK 2 MILES WEST OF THE DUPONT BRIDGE, REGULATORY INTERSECTION ON THE 2ND. AND A SANDHILL CRANE WAS ^{OBSEIVED} PRESENT SEVERAL DAYS LAST WEEK AT OTTER CREEK MARSH IN TAMA COUNTY.
