When I returned from the IOU spring meeting at Waterloo this weekend, the birdline machine had malfunctioned, and all messages on it were lost. So if you had left a message on either the 18th or 19th, please repeat it.

Of all the outstanding sightings of last week, we have had no more news about the FISH CROW in Muscatine County, the GARGANEY, WHIMBREL, or TOWNSEND'S WARBLER in Woodbury County, the IBIS (sp) in Hamilton County, or the BLACK SHOULDERED KITE in Warren County.

The IOU field trips over the weekend produced 146 total species, despite flooding conditions in many of the best birding areas. There were 28 total warbler species seen, including PINE, CAPE MAY, BAY BREASTED, KENTUCKY, PROTHONOTARY, MOURNING, and CONNECTICUT, plus YELLOW BREASTED CHAT, almost all at three locations, the Riverview Bible Conference and adjoining cemetery where the meeting was held, George Wyth State Park, and Sweet Marsh in Bremer County. All seven vireo species were counted, including WHITE EYED at the Dudgeon area north of Vinton. All the flycatchers were found except Acadian, with several ALDER, YELLOW BELLIED, and OLIVE SIDED. Both AMERICAN and LEAST BITTERNS, SORA, and VIRGINIA RAILS were at Sweet Marsh. At George Wyth State Park, a RED SHOULDERED HAWK was in the Canfield area, while a late COMMON LOON was on the lake. A CATTLE EGRET was along Wagner Road east of the Waterloo airport, and a COMMON MOORHEN was in a flooded ditch on the east side of Big Woods Road about a mile and a hald east of hiway 218. In Grundy County, there were hundreds of LESSER GOLDEN PLOVER in farm fields, and two HUDSONIAN GODWITS were also spotted.

In other reports, in the central part of the state, a WORM EATING WARBLER was at Grammer Grove Park in Marshall County and two pairs of GREAT TAILED GRACKLES were at the south end of LAKIN SLOUGH in Guthrie County on the 15th. A PINE WARBLER was seen in the Eldora cemetery in Hardin County on the 19th. Twelve CATTLE EGRETS were in the pasture at Moeckley Prarie east of Polk City on the 19th, and a SURF SCOTER was at Little Wall Lake in Hamilton County on the 18th. At the Colo Ponds in Story County on the 19th, two STILT SANDPIPERS were two miles east of Colo along old hiway 30, and 2 and a half miles north of that location there were 100 LESSER GOLDEN PLOVER, a BLACK BELLIED PLOVER, two HUDSONIAN GODWITS, DOWITCHERS, a SANDERLING, and a RUDDY Two CATTLE EGRETS were southwest of Maxwell, TURNSTONE. where hiway 210 crosses the Skunk River.

In the north central, three EARED GREBES were at Ventura Marsh, and a SHARP TAILED SPARROW at Zirbel Slough in Cerro Gordo County on the 16th.

In the southeast on the 16th at Croton Unit of Shimek State

Forest, CERULEAN, NORTHERN PARULA, KENTUCKY, and GOLDEN WINGED WARBLERS, YELLOW BREASTED CHAT, WHITE EYED VIREO, CAROLINA WREN, singing ACADIAN and ALDER FLYCATCHERS, and a BREWSTER'S hybrid WARBLER. This location is reached by going west from the stop sign in the village of Argyle for two miles and then taking the right fork and proceeding another 1.3 miles to a small parking lot on the right. Farther along this same road toward Croton, a BLUE GROSBEAK was found about a mile past the Turkey Run Des Moines River access, and near a mailbox with the name Ray Palmer, Jr. In Van Buren County, at Lacey-Keosaugua State Park, LOUISIANA WATERTHRUSH, NORTHERN PARULA, YELLOW THROATED, and WORM EATING WARBLERS, plus SCARLET TANAGER and CAROLINA WREN were at the Ely Ford and stone bridge area, while a SUMMER TANAGER was along the south entrance road 0.3 miles from the campground. Near the park, there were BELL'S VIREOS and NORTHERN MOCKINGBIRDS. Jim Fuller (319)338-3561

In Van Buren County, at Lacey-Keosenqua State Park, LOUISIANA WATERTHRUSH, NORTHERN PARULA, YELLOW THEOATED, and LOUISIANA WATERTHRUSH, NORTHERN PARULA, YELLOW THEOATED, and were at the Ely Ford and stone bridge area, while a SUBMER TANAGER was along the south entrance road 0.3 miles from the campground. Near the park, there were BELL'S VIREOB and NORTHERN MOCKINGBIRDS.
