HOWEVER, AND WERE SEEN ON THE 25TH + 26TH NEAR
PRINCETON. THERE WERE ALSO GLACIERS AND AT LEAST
ONE FIRST WINTER TRAVELER'S GULL, ^{ALONG THE RIVERBANK} IN THE QUAD CITIES
AREA ON THE 25TH.

IN NORTHEAST IOWA THE PRAIRIE FALCON FIRST RE-
PORTED ON FEB. 17TH ^{4 1/2 MILES EAST OF REINBECK IN BLACKHAWK CO} HAS BEEN SEEN GOING TO ROOST
THERE ^{1/2 MI} IN LATE AFTERNOON ON BOTH THE 25TH + 26TH. THE ROOSTING
AREA IS IN A GROUP OF EIGHT SILOS ON THE NORTH
SIDE OF HIGHWAY 175. THE BIRD MAY PERCH ON THE
SILOS OR A NEARBY CORN CRIB FOR AN HOUR OR MORE
BEFORE GOING UP ^{AS HARBINGERED ON THE 25TH + 26TH X} THE SILO TO ROOST BETWEEN 5:30 +
5:45 PM. THIS IS PRIVATE PROPERTY, SO LOOK FOR
THE BIRD FROM YOUR CAR, SO AS NOT TO DISTURB
EITHER THE FALCON OR THE OWNER. ON FEB 26TH
^{IN MARSHALL COUNTY} A SNOWY OWL WAS SEEN ALONG HIGHWAY 96,
APPROXIMATELY 1 1/2 MILES EAST OF HIGHWAY 14.
