Iowa Birdline (319)338-9881 for 8/27/91 In news today, the 27th, at least five WESTERN GREBES were still at the Silver Lake location described in the week's report, and a SWAINSON'S HAWK was a flyover along hiway 65 near the Worth-Cerro Gordo Co. line.

For the week's report: The most unusual bird in the state this past week was a FLAMINGO at the Riverton Wildlife Area in Fremont Co. It was reported by Ross Silcock on the 22nd, who you may call for more information at (712)629-5865 which is home or (712)374-2645, which is work.

In the southeast, at the Coralville Reservoir, two juvenile LEAST TERNS were at a small gull roost near the Sandy Beach Recreation Area on the 20th, along with a FRANKLIN'S GULL. Two BLACK BELLIED PLOVERS were with other shorebirds at the Twin View Heights area on the 20th. At Oakland Cemetery in Iowa City, on the 24th, 12 warbler species were observed, including GOLDEN WINGED, CAPE MAY, BLACKPOLL, and MOURNING.

In the northeast, a BARN OWL at St. Olaf in Clayton Co., was reported by Larry Stone, who can be reached at (319)783-2454 for directions to the bird.

In north central Iowa, at Silver Lake in Worth Co., six WESTERN GREBES, first discovered on August 14th by Dennis Carter, were still present through the 22nd. An adult and immature COMMON MOORHEN were in reeds just 20 yards west of the trail, and several warbler and vireo species, plus OLIVE SIDED FLYCATCHER were also near the trail. This location is only a mile or so from the Minnesota border, and is reached by exiting I-35 onto hiway 105 and going west about three and a half miles to county road S-22. Go north 3.7 miles on S-22, and then west on gravel, following the signs to the access, which is on the south side of the lake. Then walk the trail with the cable across it forty yards to the lake.

In the south central, at the Runnells Wildlife Area, among the shorebirds were BAIRD'S and BUFF BREASTED SANDPIPERS, SANDERLING, and WILSON'S PHALAROPE, and among the warblers below the hiway 316 overlook were YELLOW THROATED and GOLDEN WINGED. All these sightings were on the 24th and 25th. At Ann Johnson's yard in Warren Co., there were 16 warbler species, including CAPE MAY and PINE, plus a BELL'S VIREO on the 25th. About two to three miles east of Swan, an immature BALD EAGLE with a white shoulder mark on the right wing was spotted on the 24th. BUFF BREASTED SANDPIPERS, and BLACK BELLIED PLOVERS were in a field near where hiway 5 crosses the South River in Warren Co., and is reached by taking two right turns just south of the hiway bridge.

In central Iowa, three PEREGRINE FALCONS were seen over the Hoover Building in downtown Des Moines on the 25th, probably birds that were hacked from that area recently. Jim Fuller (319)338-3561
