Dear Dr. Kent,

It's frustrating to read your weather summaries which are based, inevitably, on conditions in Southeast Iowa. Here it was dry all spring + summer until mid July. Then rain began, saving our crops, but it petered out to occasional showers in mid August. Mr. Moore, District Biologist for S.W. Iowa, says they were able to disk Forney's Lake to bury lead shot this summer, + indeed they ~~had~~ were able to work areas they've never taken equipment in before. The lake has water now only because the game commission is pumping it in. Two farm ponds here are dry, + a well is too - we are hauling water to some hogs. Willow Slough ~~is~~ is probably still dry though the mat of dead smartweed makes it difficult to be sure. Certainly, no waterfowl are ~~are~~ going <sup>there</sup>. An area - a small area - northeast of Missouri Valley ~~was~~ was missed by the rains + had corn standing dead in ~~the~~ the fields in August. Conditions here could be summarized as narrowly averted drought. And next year? Hope it rains a lot!

The acorn + hackberry crops are abundant, keeping Red-headed Woodpeckers + Cedar Waxwings busy.

It's <sup>been</sup> ~~a~~ fall of <sup>few</sup> interesting sightings + long dull stretches. Few waterfowl. No shorebirds.
