THE ENTRANCE, GO SOUTH OF JASPER ON HIGHWAY 69 N65  
ABOUT 5 MILES AND THEN WEST ON HIGHWAY 349 A MILE,  
WHERE GO SOUTH ON GRAVEL A HALF MILE AND  
THEN TURN INTO THE ENTRANCE ROAD WHERE THE BIRD WAS IN  
THE FIRST 100 FEET. IT IS NOT KNOWN IF IT IS A CAROLINIAN OR  
PACIFIC SLICE FLYCATERER

IN THE NORTHEAST IN ALLAMAKEE COUNTY,  
A RED NECKED GREBE WAS JUST ABOVE ~~THE~~  
~~A~~ LOCK & DAM #9, <sup>ON THE MISSISSIPPI RIVER</sup> AT HARPER'S FERRY  
THERE WERE ALSO 200 TUFTED SWAN &  
MILES ABOVE THE DAM ALONG THE TOWN SITE,  
FOUR GOLDEN EAGLES WERE SEEN IN THEIR  
USUAL WINTERING LOCATION ALONG COUNTY  
ROAD A26 - SOUTHWEST OF NEW ALBIN

IN NEWS FROM THE 13<sup>TH</sup>, IN THE SOUTHWEST, THE  
TOWN SEND IS SOLITARY DISCOVERED BY BJ ROSE  
AND ROSS SILLOCK IN FREMONT COUNTY ON THE  
11<sup>TH</sup>, WAS STILL PRESENT. TO LOOK FOR THIS  
BIRD, FROM HIGHWAY 2 ~~NEAR WINDSOR STATE~~  
~~RD~~, ABOUT 5 MILES EAST OF I-29, GO NORTH  
ON COUNTY ROAD C-44 A MILE AND A HALF AND

IN NEWS FROM THE 11<sup>TH</sup>, THE RED PHALAROPE WAS NOT FOUND AT LAKE ROBINSON TODAY. ~~THERE WERE~~ THE NUMBER OF SHOREBIRDS THERE IS DOWN, BUT THERE WERE SEVERAL SPECIES, INCLUDING PUNUP, BLACK BELLED PLOVER, AND BIRD'S SANDPIPER.

IN THE SOUTHWEST, B. J. RIFE AND ROSS SILLOCK FOUND A TOWNSEND'S SOOTY WING IN FREMONT COUNTY NORTH OF WAUSAU STATE PARK. FOR MORE INFORMATION, CALL ROSS SILLOCK AT (712) 629-5865.

IN THE NORTHEAST, AT PLEASANT CREEK STATE RECREATION AREA IN LINN COUNTY, AN OLD SWAN WAS WITH A FLOCK OF 50 SCANS OFF THE BEACH, AND THERE WERE 2 HORNS GRIBES AS WELL.

IN JOHN SON COUNTY, A ROSS' GOOSE HAS BEEN IN WITH THE TAME MALLARDS FOR A MONTH NOW <sup>ON THE POND</sup> AT S. MORRISON PARK IN CORACOILLE AND A HORNS GRIBE WAS JUST NORTH OF THE MENAFFEY BRIDGE AT THE CORACOILLE RESERVOIR.

It has been an exciting week, as waterfowl have returned to the state on their way south. BALD EAGLES and COMMON LOONS have been widely reported, and we have had news of two road-killed SNOWY OWLS. And summer birds too, as TREE SWALLOWS were still being seen over the past weekend at several locations. The highlights are RED PHALAROPE and PACIFIC and RED-THROATED LOONS in the south-central and WHITE-WINGED SCOTERS in Linn and Des Moines Counties.

In the south-central at Rathbun Reservoir in Appanoose County, Tom Kent discovered a RED PHALAROPE on the 8th. The location is reached by taking the Island View detour road to the second set of barricades, and the bird was toward the end of the peninsula beyond the barricades. ~~For updates call Tom Johnson at (515)473-4099.~~ There were also seven other shorebird species there, including DUNLIN and BLACK-BELLIED PLOVER. In the bay where the marina is located, there were two PACIFIC LOONS, and two HORNED and two EARED GREBES. At the Prarie Ridge Area, a NORTHERN GOSHAWK was spotted. At Red Rock Reservoir in Marion County, a RED-THROATED LOON found on the 7th on the IOU field trip, was joined by a PACIFIC LOON on the 8th, off the marina boat ramp at the West Wallaschuck Area on the north side of the lake. There were also a number of COMMON LOONS in that area as well, and two SNOW BUNTINMGs along the shore there. There are thousands of gulls at Red Rock, mostly RING-BILLED, but with some HERRINGS and BONAPARTE'S, and an adult THAYER'S GULL was spotted flying below the dam on the 8th.

In the central, two BLACK-BELLIED PLOVERS were on the beach at Big Creek State Park in Polk County on the 6th. A SNOWY OWL was found dead along hiway 30, a mile east of Nevada in Story County on the 5th.

In the northeast, another road-killed SNOWY OWL was found along hiway 9 in the Decorah area on the 6th. At Pleasant Creek State Recreation Area in Linn County, two WHITE-WINGED SCOTERS, one an adult male, were observed through the 7th, and four SNOW BUNTINGS were on the beach there.

In the north-central, large flocks of LAPLAND LONGSPURS were reported along I-35 in Franklin and Wright Counties on the 4th.

In the southeast in Des Moines County, a male WHITE-WINGED SCOTER and four HORNED GREBES were just above Lock & Dam #18 on the Mississippi River, as viewed from the Illinois side, on the 8th. In Iowa County, an immature NORTHERN SHRIKE was a half mile east of East Amana, and a HORNED GREBE was on the Amana Lily Pond on the 3rd. In Johnson County, three SNOW BUNTINGS were on the campground beach at the Sugar Bottom Area of the Coralville Reservoir through the 7th, and a very late NASHVILLE WARBLER was at Lake MacBride State Park on the 3rd. Red four SNOW BUNTINGS were on the beach there.

In the north-central, large flocks of LARRED GREENES were  
reported along I-35 in Franklin and Wright Counties on the  
8th.

In the southeast in Des Moines County, a male WHITE-WINGED  
SCOTER and four HORNED GREENES were just above look 2 on the 7th  
on the Mississippi River, as viewed from the Illinois side,  
on the 8th. In Iowa County, an immature NORTHERN WILKIE was  
a half mile east of East Amana, and a HORNED GREENE was on  
the Anna Lily Pond on the 8th. In Johnson County, three  
SNOW BUNTINGS were on the campground beach at the Upper  
Cedar Area of the Des Moines Reservoir through the 7th, and  
a very large HERRING GULL was at Lake Aechide State
