Ow THE STA In the northwest in Palo Alto County, Ron Harms reports at least one, and possibly up to three SANDHILL CRANES in the marshy area on the west side of Rush Lake.

> In the southeast at the Coralville Reservoir in Johnson County, a BUFF-BREASTED SANDPIPER, along with an immature BALD EAGLE and a late COMMON MERGANSER were at the Sand Point Area. And we had a secondhand report of YELLOW-CROWNED NIGHT HERONS at the Toolesboro Access off of hiway #99 in Louisa County on the 23rd. ALSO THERE WERE PROTHONATING WARBLENS AND A DUNLIN

And, for the week's report......There are still migrant warblers, flycatchers, and shorebirds moving through the state. It is the time to look for Mourning and Connecticut Warblers, Alder and Yellow-bellied Flycatchers, and White-rumped Sandpipers.

In the southwest, the season's first report of LEAST TERN came from Pottawattamie County at the south IPL pond south of Council Bluffs by Ross Silcock on the 24th. Also present there were PIPING PLOVERS and CASPIAN TERNS. Elsewhere, at the Riverton Area in Fremont County, among the shorebirds on the 23rd were RUDDY TURNSTONE, DUNLIN, HUDSONIAN GODWIT, STILT and WHITE-RUMPED SANDPIPERS, and DOWITCHERS. A male and three female GREAT-TAILED GRACKLES were seen in Council Bluffs on the 23rd at a marshy area along hiways 92-175 less than a mile west of I-29. In Taylor County, the BARN OWLS are nesting for the fourth straight year at the Delbert Freemyer farm, which is six miles east and a mile south of Bedford. You can call Delbert for more information at (712)523-2680.

IN the central at the Runnells Wildlife Area in Marion County, there were still several thousand shorebirds on the 23rd, which included HUDSONIAN GODWIT, DUNLIN, WHITE-RUMPED SANDPIPER, and DOWITCHERS. At Grammer Grover Park in Marshall County, CONNECTICUT and MOURNING WARBLERS on the 21rst, and on the 23rd YELLOW-BELLIED and OLIVE-SIDED FLYCATCHERS, and MOURNING and GOLDEN-WINGED WARBLERS, and a CAPE MAY WARBLER in the Proescholdt's yard in Liscomb.

In the northeast on the 24th, a RUDDY TURNSTONE was at the beach of Pleasant Creek State Park in Linn County, and a DUNLIN and BLACK-BELLIED PLOVER were at a wet spot two miles south of Pleasant Creek along Lewis Bottoms Road.

In the southeast, MOURNING and CONNECTICUT WARBLERS were reported from north of Iowa City and at Hickory Hill Park in Iowa City on the 23rd and 24th. There have also been ALDER FLYCATCHER, YELLOW-BREASTED CHAT, and WHITE-EYED VIREO at Hickory Hill. In Lee County at the Croton Unit of Shimek State Forest, the PRARIE WARBLER was still singing along the east edge of the large open area on top of the hill, and the WORM-EATING WARBLER was still singing near the rock

outcrop along the road there on the 19th. South of Burlington, YELLOW-CROWNED NIGHT HERONS are present and presumed nesting again this year at the end of the Sullivan Slough Road. For more information, call Chuck Fuller at (319)753-0710.

In the northwest, two CONNECTICUT WARBLERS were seen at Moorhead Park in Ida County on the 22nd.
