Then turn north on gravel, cross the railroad tracks, and after the road turns west continue to where the power lines cross the road. On the 11th, the bird was in a wet area on the north side of the road there. Earlier in the week, it had been in the field to the north as soon as the road turns west, but that area has pretty well dried up. Also seen there on the 7th were a PEREGRINE FALCON, BUFF-BREASTED SANDPIPERS, and LESSER GOLDEN PLOVER.
