② AT THE SAILORVILLE RESERVOIR, NORTH OF DES MOINES, A FIRST YEAR THAYER'S GULL WAS REPORTED FROM THE AREA OF THE DAM BY ROB PLANK, A MICHIGAN BIRDER ON THE 23RD.

③ IN JOHNSON COUNTY ON THE 20TH, NINE SHOREBIRD SPECIES WERE SEEN AT THE CARROLLVILLE RESERVOIR ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF ~~STASS~~ COUNTY ROAD F-20 WHICH IS COY FAU ROAD ABOUT 2 MILES WEST OF HIGHWAY 965.


Update of Iowa Birdline (319)338-9881 for 10/20/92

In news from the northwest, in Cherokee County, the LEWIS' WOODPECKER has not been seen either the 19th or 20th. It was discovered by Marion Brewer on the 14th, and was seen every day through Sunday, the 18th. This would be a third state record for this species, but the last sighting was in 1936. The location is reached by going west on county road C-66 out of Washta and cross the Little Sioux River. Then turn north on gravelled Wasta Road for two miles, and then east on 630th Street for 1.5 miles. At the T, make two quick left turns and go northwest for a quarter mile, where the road hooks northeast to a dead end. The bird likes to sit on the second large power pole to the east. Please respect private property, and stay on the road. In fact, we had a personal request from the property owner to do so. For more information, call Marion Brewer at (712)225-3350.

In Sac County, a thousand or more FRANKLIN'S GULLS were reported from Black Hawk Lake on the 18th.

In ~~exciting~~ news from Cherokee County, a ^{THE} LEWIS' WOODPECKER, was first seen 3 miles NE of Washta at 2 pm on the 12th and has been seen each of the last three days. To find it go W on C-66 thru Washta across the river; turn N on gravel ~~I-40~~ for 2 ^{washta rd} miles then E 1.5 miles; at the T make 2 quick left turns to go NW for 1/4 mile where the road hooks NE to a dead end. The bird likes to sit on the 2nd large power line to the E. For more information call Marion Brewer at (712) 225-3350. Also in Cherokee County NE of Larabee an immature GOLDEN EAGLE was seen on the 13th. In Ida County, at Moorhead Park on the 12th: 28 PINE SISKINS and on the 14th 2 WINTER WRENS and 2 CLAY-COLORED SPARROWS.

630th St.
In the south-central, a bonanza of late season shorebirds was located at Lake Rathbun in Appanoose County. On the 8th, four RED KNOTS and eleven AMERICAN AVOCETS were present, and on the 9th, the knots and avocets had departed, but there were still nine shorebird species, unusual for so late in the year. They included DUNLIN, LONG-BILLED DOWITCHER, and SANDERLING, and there was also a MERLIN. The location is Dedication Point, which is reached from south of the dam by turning into the Island View Area until you encounter barricades and then turn right. At Red Rock Reservoir in Marion County, nine waterfowl species and eleven sparrow species, including LINCOLN'S and WHITE-CROWNED, were observed on the 10th. 

In the central at the Saylorville Reservoir in Polk County, there was a RUDDY TURNSTONE, as well as ten SANDERLINGS between the Cherry Glen Area and the Oak Grove beach on the 11th, and the season's first report of ROUGH-LEGGED HAWK came from Warren County on the 11th. An IBIS species was a flyby at Runnells overlook along hiway 316 on the 11th.

~~In the South central~~: nine COMMON LOONS were seen at Red Rock on the 14th.

In the northeast at Pleasant Creek Lake State Park north of Palo in Linn County, there were FRANKLIN'S and BONAPARTE'S GULLS, plus a SANDERLING on the beach on the 9th, and two BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERONS were at Cedar Lake in Cedar Rapids on the 7th.

In the southeast, six WINTER WRENS were located at Hickory Hill Park in Iowa City on the 7th. In Des Moines County at the Casey-Barrow Public Landing on the Mississippi River, ten miles north of Burlington, there are still quite a few shorebirds, which included BLACK-BELLIED, LESSER GOLDEN, and SEMIPALMATED PLOVERS on the 11th, and in the same area just above Lock & Dam #18, there were four HORNED GREBES on the 11th.

In the Southwest: An immature GOLDEN EAGLE was at Hitchcock Nature Area 4.5 mi. N of Crescent in Pottawattamie County on the 11th & the 12th.
