IN A REPORT OF A TRIP BY THE PROSCHOLATS TO THE SOUTHWEST ON JUNE 8<sup>TH</sup> AND 9<sup>TH</sup>. AT LACEY-KEASAULDA STATE PARK IN THE ELIZABETH AREA, <sup>THEY HAD</sup> NORTHERN PARULA, YELLOW THROATED WARBLER, ACADIAN FLYCATCHER AND CAROLINA WREN, AT THE CAMPGROUND WERE 2 BENICK'S WREN'S AND A SUMMER Tanager, AND AT LEAST 3 HEARLOW'S SPARROWS WERE SINGING IN THE FIELD SOUTH OF THE PARK. IN LEE COUNTY, THERE WERE 2 BENICK'S WREN'S AT THE TOWN-YARD WEST OF ARYLE. AT THE CROTON UNIT OF SHIMER STATE FOREST, THE PRARIE WARBLER WAS STILL PRESENT AND OTHER BIRDS THERE INCLUDED BLUE WINGED AND KENTUCKY WARBLERS, YELLOW BREASTED CHAT, LOUISIANA WATER THRUSH, A CADIAN FLYCATCHER, AND WHITE EYED VIREO. IN JOHNSON COUNTY TODAY, A MISSISSIPPI KITE WAS OBSERVED FOR 25 MINUTES ON THE EAST SIDE OF IOWA CITY IN THE AREA OF THE ROUNDNER <sup>BEING</sup> HALL'S STORE, THE NORTHERN MOCKINGBIRD WAS SEEN <sup>ABOUT 3/4 MILE</sup> EAST OF WILLIAMS PRAIRIE, AND AN ALDER FLYCATCHER WAS SINGING IN THE BIRDLINE'S YARD THIS MORNING.

② IN REPORTS RECEIVED ~~FROM~~ <sup>THE 8<sup>TH</sup></sup> THE NORTH CENTRAL IN NORTH COUNTY ON THE 7<sup>TH</sup> AT THE EAST END OF RICE LAKE, 3 WESTERN GREBS, 14 RUDDY DUCKS, AND A FEMALE NORTHERN HARRIER. A MILE EAST OF THERE AT FOX CREEK MARSH WILDLIFE AREA A SINGING LEAST FLYCATCHER, AND AT SILVER LAKE A NESTING COLONY OF 60 BLACK TERNS. AT ALLONA ALONG THE DES MOINES RIVER AND AT CALL STATE PARK ON THE 7<sup>TH</sup>, 2 YELLOW BELLYED FLYCATCHERS, A VEERY, MORNING, BAY BREASTED, HOODED, AND CERULEAN WARBLERS, OVEBAND AND PILEATED WOODPECKER.

It appears there are still a few migrants in the state. The best birds of last week all continue to be seen; PRARIE WARBLER, HENSLOW'S SPARROW, and BEWICK'S WREN in the southeast, and GREAT-TAILED GRACKLE and SANDHILL CRANE in the central.

In the southeast in Lee County, the PRARIE WARBLER was still singing on the east side of the largest open area on top of the hill at the Croton Unit of Shimek State Forest on the 7th, and a HOODED WARBLER was in the woods nearby on the 2nd. In Van Buren County at Lacey-Keosauqua State Park, a RED-SHOULDERED HAWK was along the main road near the campground, the BEWICK'S WRENS were in the campground, and the HENSLOW'S SPARROWS were just south of the park. To look for the sparrows, exit the newly blacktopped south entrance road and go right at two intersections. Park in a small lot on the right side of the road, and the field with the sparrows is across the road. In Des Moines County, YELLOW-CROWNED NIGHT HERONS have been seen regularly at the end of the Sullivan Slough Road south of Burlington. In Johnson County, during a breeding bird survey this past weekend, probable nesters of interest were PROTHONATARY WARBLER and NORTHERN PARULA at Lake MacBride, WILSON'S PHALAROPE and LEAST FLYCATCHER in the Sand Point area of the Coralville Reservoir, and HOODED MERGANSERS and YELLOW-HEADED BLACKBIRDS at Swan Lake. Other birds of note were BLACK-BELLIED PLOVER, WHITE-RUMPED SANDPIPER, FRANKLIN'S GULL, and BLACK TERN in the Sand Point area, and a male MOURNING WARBLER in the Hoosier Creek area.

In the central in Tama County, good news from Otter Creek Marsh, where there are now four SANDHILL CRANES, including two half grown young. They have been seen in fields along the north side of the marsh, especially early in the morning. There were also two HOODED MERGANSERS at Otter Creek last week. At Union Grove State Park, five female HOODED MERGANSERS were on the public hunting pond southwest of the main lake on the 7th. In Wright County, four BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERONS, three FRANKLIN'S GULLS, a COMMON TERN, and seven CASPIAN TERNS were seen at Big Wall Lake on the 6th. GREAT-TAILED GRACKLES continue to be present at Lakin Slough in Guthrie County, with the latest observation on the 6th. Out-of-range WESTERN KINGBIRDS were reported in Carroll County three miles southwest of Glidden, and in Polk County just east of Des Moines along 70th Avenue at an intersection 0.1 miles north of hiway #163.

In the northeast in Jackson County, 45 AMERICAN WHITE PELICANS were observed on a Mississippi River backwater area near Sabula on the 2nd.

In the north-central in Cerro Gordo County, at Ventura Marsh 50 WHITE PELICANS and a half dozen FORSTER'S TERNS which are probably nesters were seen on the 7th, FRANKLIN'S GULLS at

Clear Lake on the 5th, and a PROTHONATARY WARBLER along the south shore of Clear Lake on the 3rd.
