The early passerine migration is virtually over, and some of the later migrants being reported now include the SPARROWS, KINGLETS, WINTER WREN, BROWN CREEPER, and PINE SISKIN. It was interesting that RED-SHOULDERED HAWK, an uncommon bird in the state, was a reported migrant in both Johnson and Marshall Counties over the past weekend. No really unusual sightings occurred in the state this week, but some of the interesting reports were:

In the northeast in Winneshiek County, a male BLACK-THROATED BLUE WARBLER was at Twin Springs Park in Decorah on the 8th, and a PEREGRINE FALCON was sitting on a sandbar in Cedar Lake at Cedar Rapids on the 8th.

In the central in Polk County, a flock of twelve GREAT-TAILED GRACKLES was at the Brenton feedlot north of Grimes, and a HORNED GREBE was at Moeckley Prarie on the 8th. In Boone County, two AMERICAN PIPITS and 30 LESSER GOLDEN PLOVER were at a pond located two miles north of Ogden on the 2nd. In Grundy County, a PINE WARBLER was at Wolf Creek Park on the 4th. In Marshall County, 94 raptors, including 9 BALD EAGLES and a RED-SHOULDERED HAWK, plus a vee of 22 GREAT EGRETS passed over Grammer Grove Park on the 9th, and a hybrid CANADA/SNOW GOOSE was at the Riverside Cemetery Pond in Marshalltown on the 6th. In Tama County, three SANDHILL CRANES were still present at Otter Creek Marsh on the 2nd. In Jasper County at the Oswolt Bridge Area west of Colfax, there were ten shorebird species with BAIRD'S SANDPIPER, and BLACK-BELLIED and LESSER GOLDEN

PLOVERS, plus AMERICAN PIPITS on the 7th.

In the southeast in Johnson County, the Babcock Access at the Coralville Reservoir is again accesible after being under water for months, and along the entrance road there on the 8th there were eight shorebird species, including DUNLIN, STILT SANDPIPER, BAIRD'S SANDPIPER, and LONG-BILLED DOWITCHER, plus AMERICAN PIPIT. At Lake MacBride State Park, eight sparrow species, including LINCOLN'S and HARRIS', were seen on the 10th.
