Thanks to Jim Scheib for handling the Birdline last week while I was off in the northeast chasing puffins, shearwaters, petrels, and other such things.

The A.O.U. held its national convention in Ames the latter part of last week, and some of the birds seen on the field trips were BELL'S VIREO and WILLOW FLYCATCHER at Doolittle Prarie north of Ames, and SEDGE WREN at Tieg's Marsh, both in Story County. A COMMON LOON and ten BLACK TERNS were at Little Wall Lake in Hamilton County. In Boone County at Ledges State Park where the two creeks join, there were two YELLOW-THROATED WARBLERS, a CAROLINA WREN, VEERY, and LOUISIANA WATERTHRUSH. Where the creek enters the Des Moines River, a PILEATED WOODPECKER and BROAD-WINGED HAWK were spotted, and a quarter mile south of there along the park road, a NORTHERN PARULA and three LARK SPARROWS were present. Elsewhere in the central in Story County on the 28th, at Hendrickson Marsh, a WHITE PELICAN, adult BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERON, an OSPREY, and five LESSER YELLOWLEGS were observed, and two miles east of Collins, two adult and two young UPLAND SANDPIPERS have been seen almost daily in recent days. In Tama County, the family of four SANDHILL CRANES was seen once again at Otter Creek Marsh on the 25th. Look south from the area where R Street and county road E-66 intersect, which is about 1.1 miles southeast of highway 30.

In the northwest in Kossuth County, the shorebirds are returning, as four species, including a BAIRD'S SANDPIPER were in flooded bean fields east of West Bend on the 28th.

In the southeast in Johnson County, just south of the causeway at Lake MacBride State Park, an ORCHARD ORIOLE and an OSPREY were seen on the 25th. Jim Fuller (319)338-3561
