In news from the 7th in Johnson County, a female BLACK-THROATED BLUE WARBLER and immature COOPER'S HAWK were seen at Oakland Cemetery in Iowa City near the path to Hickory Hill Park, and there are now as many as 250 WHITE PELICANS at the Hawkeye Wildlife Area of the Coralville Reservoir. And for the week's report.....

The best birds this week are KING RAIL, RED-NECKED PHALAROPE, MISSISSIPPI KITE, BLACK-THROATED BLUE WARBLER, and SANDHILL CRANE.

In the southeast, a male BLACK-THROATED BLUE WARBLER was seen on the 5th at Hickory Hill Park in Iowa City at the triangle on top of the hill, just south of the south canyon, and just east of Oakland Cemetery. On the 6th, both a male and female were found at the same location. There were 14 other warbler species there including CANADA, GOLDEN-WINGED, and MOURNING. And in the Birdline's backyard north of Iowa City on the 6th, there were twelve warbler species, including a PINE. In Des Moines County, at Casey-Barrow Public Landing on the Mississippi River ten miles north of Burlington, two KING RAILS, RUDDY TURNSTONES, SANDERLINGS, WILSON'S and RED-NECKED PHALAROPES, and BLACK-BELLIED PLOVERS were among the shorebirds present on the 6th. There were also CASPIAN, BLACK, and FORSTER'S TERNS.

In the central at Otter Creek Marsh in Tama County, seven SANDHILL CRANES were regular last week flying over the marsh and bugling around eight in the morning.

In the south-central, a MISSISSIPPI KITE was a flyover on the 1st in Marion County at the Cordova Park Ranger's Station, and ten warbler species were found there on the 1st, including two CAPE MAYS in the pine grove in the front yard. Twelve shorebirds species were counted around the Red Rock Reservoir on the 1st.

In the southwest in Fremont County, 80 WHITE PELICANS were on the Hamburg borrow pit along I-29, and afforded excellent photographic opportunities from the Lakeview Inn. For more information, call Ross Silcock at (721)629-5865.
