Another rather quiet week in the state, but it would appear that with the receding flood waters, good shorebird habitat should be developing.

And in southwest Iowa, a number of good birds were found in flooded areas. On the 7th in Fremont County, nine shorebird species were observed, including BUFF-BREASTED SANDPIPERS and MARBLED GODWITS on the east side of the Percival Road, which is L-31, a mile and a half north of hiway 2. As many as 20-30 LITTLE BLUE HERONS, and 30 GREAT EGRETS were on the south side of hiway 2 near the first road west of I-29, and there are hundreds of CATTLE EGRETS in the area. In Pottawattamie County, a RUDDY TURNSTONE was at the north IPL pond on the 7th.

In the central in Story County, six shorebird species, including STILT SANDPIPERS were at the Colo ponds east of Colo on the 6th. In Marshall County, one of the few records for nesting CATTLE EGRETS in the state has been this year on an island in a sandpit which is along East Main Street, a mile east of Marshalltown.

In the southeast in Van Buren County at Lacey-Keosauqua State Park, ACADIAN FLYCATCHERS were by the stone bridge near the entrance to Ely Ford and at the campgrounds, where there was also a pair of SUMMER TANAGERS on the 6th. In Louisa County, an UPLAND SANDPIPER was north of Cone Marsh on the south side of County Road G-28 about a hundred yards east of Atwood Avenue.
