Iowa Birdline (319)338-9881 for 8/31/92 Migrants which were conspicuous last week besides warblers and vireos, were catbirds, kingbirds, cuckoos, brown thrashers, and flycatchers.

In the southeast, the Casey-Barrow Public Landing on the Mississippi River ten miles north of Burlington, continues to be a good spot, and the birds there seem to change every day. On the 26th, there were two RUDDY TURNSTONES, six HUDSONIAN GODWITS, and a SANDERLING, while on the 27th a PEREGRINE FALCON, NORTHERN HARRIER, and OSPREY, and on the 30th, a BUFF-BREASTED SANDPIPER. Nearby in Des Moines County, 20 LESSER GOLDEN PLOVER and an early BROAD-WINGED HAWK were seen on the 27th. And the EURASIAN TREE SPARROWS appear to be permanently established just north of Burlington, and some can be found at any time of year. For more information, call Chuck Fuller at (319)753-0710. At Hickory Hill Park in Iowa City, 14 warbler species were present on the 28th, and included CONNECTICUT, PINE, and GOLDEN-WINGED, plus YELLOW-BELLIED FLYCATCHER. The RINGED-TURTLE DOVE continues to be seen near downtown Muscatine through the 30th. For more information, call Devin Pettit at (319)264-0838.

In the central in Polk County on the 29th, BUFF-BREASTED and BAIRD'S SANDPIPERS, RUDDY TURNSTONES, and SANDERLINGS were at the beach of Sandpiper Recreation Area of the Saylorville Reservoir, and RUDDY TURNSTONES were also present at Oak Grove and Cherry Glen. Two PIPING PLOVERS were at the Sandpiper beach on the 25th. On the 30th, Pam and Reid Allen had a WESTERN KINGBIRD in their West Des Moines yard.

In the south-central, at Red Rock Reservoir in Marion County on the 26th, there were two RUDDY TURNSTONES with the gulls and pelicans on the gravel bars below the Red Rock Dam, a SANDERLING was at the Coalport Boat Ramp, and observed along the west side of the lake were ten warbler species, plus OLIVE-SIDED, LEAST, and WILLOW FLYCATCHERS.

In the northwest, at Moorhead Park in Ida County, there were 14 warbler species, including CONNECTICUT, plus OLIVE-SIDED FLYCATCHER on the 26th. Jim Fuller (319)338-3561

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
