This is the Iowa Birdline with news of ROCK WREN, BEWICK'S WREN, SCISSOR-TAILED FLYCATCHER, WHITE-FACED IBIS, GREAT-TAILED GRACKLE, SANDHILL CRANE, LITTLE BLUE HERON, and RED-NECKED GREBE. There were no further reports of the CINNAMON TEAL after its sighting in Marion County on the 20th.

The big news is from Warren County, where a ROCK WREN was present all day until dark at the home of David and Lisa Youngblut, 957 Fillmore, Lot 6. Directions are as follows: From hiways 65-69 south of Des Moines, go west west on county road G-24 for three and a quarter miles, then south on 98th Avenue for a half mile, then west on Fillmore for a quarter mile. Turn right where there are three mailboxes, and then turn left into lot 6, which is a white house with flowerbeds constructed of railroad ties. The wren has been in the flowerbeds. A NORTHERN MOCKINGBIRD was also in the yard on the 25th, and EASTERN SCREECH OWLS are in a nest box at the back of the house. You can call the Youngbluts at (515)961-0425, or call David at work at the Warren County Conservation Board at (515)961-6169.

In the central in Guthrie County, the eight WHITE-FACED IBIS were still at the north end of Bay's Branch, and a LARK SPARROW was along the west side of the lake on the 25th. HORNED GREBES and AMERICAN AVOCETS were there on the 21rst. At the south end of Lakin Slough, up to seventeen GREAT-TAILED GRACKLES were seen on the 25th, many of which were in the farmlot to the west. MARBLED GODWIT and WHITE-FRONTED GEESE were there on the 21rst. Another GREAT-TAILED GRACKLE was at nearby Long's Pond on the 25th, and a BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERON was there on the 21rst. In Story County at the Colo Ponds east of Colo on the 24th and 25th, there were LESSER GOLDEN PLOVER, BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERONS, HUDSONIAN GODWIT, WILSON'S PHALAROPE, and WILLET. At Larsen's Marsh, which is along 13th Street about four miles east of Ames, four VIRGINIA RAILS were seen on the 24th. In Hamilton County, HORNED and EARED GREBES and FRANKLIN'S GULLS were at Little Wall lake on the 24th. In Tama County, at Otter Creek Marsh, up to three SANDHILL CRANES were seen several times last week, most often in fields south of county road E-66, near where R Street intersects. A CATTLE EGRET was just south of E-66, near its junction with hiway 30 on the 25th, and three IBIS (Sp.) were seen flying over the north dike about midway along its length on the 25th. A VIRGINIA RAIL and AMERICAN BITTERN were spotted from the north dike on the 25th. In Marshall County, four BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERONS were at Grammer Grove Park on the 24th.

In the northwest in Dickinson County, a RED-NECKED GREBE was seen at the north end of Big Spirit Lake from Minnewaca Park on the 21rst. In Kossuth County on the morning of the 25th, a SCISSOR-TAILED FLYCVATCHER was in the farmyard of Barb

Meyer, who lives about five miles south of Titonka, but it was not relocated later in the day. If it reappears, we will update with better directions.

In the northeast in Allamakee County, an immature LITTLE BLUE HERON and a CATTLE EGRET were at Cardinal Marsh on the 24th, and RED-NECKED GREBES were at that location on 19th-21rst. In Linn County, three CATTLE EGRETS were along hiway 13 about a mile and a half north of Central City on the 25th.

In the southeast in Des Moines County. MUTE and TUNDRA SWANS, EARED GREBE, and BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERONS were at Blackhawk Bottoms Wildlife Area south of Burlington, and MARBLED GODWIT and CATTLE EGRET were along Tama Road north of Burlington on the 23rd. Although we have had no further news since the 17th of the two BEWICK'S WRENS at the junkyard in Lee County, we would assume that they are still present. To look for these birds, from the stop sign in the village of Argyle, go west two miles to a Y. Take the right fork and the junkyard is in 0.3-4 miles.
