On the 15th, in Marion County at Red Rock Reservoir, there were WHITE PELICANS, fifteen duck species, including all three MERGANSERS, and AMERICAN PIPITS at the South Elk Rock boat ramp. The **BLACK-THROATED SPARROW** in Waterloo and the **CINNAMON TEAL** at Cone Marsh continue to be seen routinely thru the weekend. The **BLACK-THROATED SPARROW** was still being seen on the 23rd and the **CINNAMON TEAL** was still present on the 20th with no report of its presence or absence since.

An immature **BARROWS GOLDEN-EYE** was reported on the northern IPL pond south of Council Bluffs on the 18th but has not been seen since. For details call the Nebraska birdline at 402-292-5325.

The **BLACK-THROATED SPARROW** is at the feeder of Maurice and Ruby Hanson, 1262 Ackermant. From hiway 63 north of the downtown Waterloo, go west on Parker for five blocks, and then north on Ackermant about two blocks to the end of the street. It is the 2nd last house on the east side. Pull into the alley which runs along the east side of the yard, and park by the garage. The Hansons can be reached at 319-233-2457 and our thanks to the Hansons for their hospitality to birders this past week.

The Drake **CINNAMON TEAL** at Cone Marsh south of Lone Tree in Louisa County was still being seen on the 20th. It was with 6 **BLUE-WINGED TEAL** in a small pond which is just next to the road and somewhat embedded into the bank on the east side of the marsh in the area of the railroad car cabin. The east side of the marsh can be reached by taking T Avenue south from Co. Rd. G-28 S of Lone Tree.

And for the week's report: As winter tries to hang on, migrating birds are pushing into the state in great numbers. Blackbirds, Meadowlarks, Hawks, Great Blue Herons, and ducks and Geese are braving the last snows of the season in Iowa to move into spring.

In the southeast N of Burlington on the 20th a **RED-SHOULDERED HAWK** was seen one mile north of the IBP plant on RT. 78 at the small marsh along the River.

In the Northwest a MERLIN was reported 3 miles NW of Sioux Center on the 20th.

In the North-central, at least one of the two **TOWNSEND'S SOLITAIRES** were still in the Shell Rock River greenbelt in Cerro Gordo Co. as of the 20th. To look for these birds go south from Rock Falls on county road S-62 for one mile, and then east on 295th street for a mile and a half. Park just west of a cement bridge and walk south 200-250 yards. For updates, call Kurt nelson at (515)696-5600. There was also a **NORTHERN GOSHAWK** flyover there on the 20th.

A male VARIED THRUSH is coming to the feeder of Dave and Carol Gunderson of Union in Hardin county. This bird is best viewed from inside the house in the morning. Birders are welcomed to call the Gundersons at 515-486-2355 to arrange a visit. Land sum the 23-d. Han's scanner also coming to the full.

On the 20th hundreds of ducks and geese could be viewed at Bay's Branch in Gutherie county.

For updates, call Kurt nelson at (515)696-5600. In the south-central in Marion County, on the 15th at Red Rock Reservoir, there were WHITE PELICANS, fifteen duck species, including all three MERGANSERS, and AMERICAN PIPITS at the South Elk Rock boat ramp.
