Despite the weather this past week, early passerine migrants appeared in the state, some of which were EASTERN PHOEBE, RUFOUS-SIDED TOWHEE, HERMIT THRUSH, KINGLETS of both species, TREE SWALLOWS, and FOX, FIELD, SWAMP, and CHIPPING SPARROWS. The highlights are the continued presence of BLACK-THROATED SPARROW and TOWNSEND'S SOLITAIRE, plus a PRARIE FALCON in the northwest.

In the northeast, the BLACK-THROATED SPARROW was still being seen at Waterloo, at least through April 4th. It is at the feeder of Maurice and Ruby Hanson, 1262 Ackermant. From hiway #63 north of the downtown area, go west on Parker for five blocks, and then north on Ackermant about two blocks to the end of the street, where the Hanson live on the east side. For a close look at the feeder, pull into the alley that runs along the east side of their yard, and park by the garage. The bird also hangs out in a brush pile behind the neighbor's garage to the north. You can call the Hansons at (319)233-2457. In Linn County at Pleasant Creek State Recreation Area north of Palo, six COMMON LOONS and two EARED GREBES were present on the 4th, and a YELLOWLEGS (Sp.) was nearby. At Cedar Lake in Cedar Rapids, BONAPARTE'S GULLS and HORNED GREBES were seen on the 2nd.

In the north-central in cerro Gordo County, the two TOWNSEND'S SOLITAIRES were still being seen in the Shell Rock River greenbelt, at least through the 4th. From Rock Falls, go south on county road S-62 for one mile, and then east on 3th Street for a mile and a half. Park just west of a cement bridge, and walk south 200-250 yards. TUNDRA SWANS were seen at Clear Lake on the 2nd, and at the north edge of Plymouth, near where county road S-56 intersects 340th Street on the 1rst. Also on the 1rst, a large flock of LAPLAND LONGSPURS was seen three miles east of hiway #65 along county road B-20, near where it intersects Raymond Avenue. At least one SMITH'S LONGSPUR and one SNOW BUNTING were in the flock. In Bremer County, three GREATER SCAUP were above the dam on the Cedar River at Nashua on the 2nd.

In the northwest in Clay County, a PRARIE FALCON was located on the 3rd and 4th one mile west of Lost Island Lake, where the road turns south to go to Beringer Slough, and a RED SHOULDERED HAWK was seen on the southeast side of Spencer, just north of hiway #18 on the 4th. In Ida County, LEAST SANDPIPER, DOWITCHER (Sp.), and HORNED GREBE were at Moorhead Park on the 1rst.

In the southeast in Johnson County, an EARED GREBE was at Swan Lake on the 4th, and at Lake MacBRide a HORNED GREBE on the 2nd, and a COMMON LOON in breeding plumage on the 4th.
