Today, we went to Meinking Marsh. There were at least 8 ring-billed gulls on what appeared to be nests. Also, a pair (I do mean pair) of American Bitterns. Yellow-headed blackbirds and a forester's tern also. Bobolinks and Dickcissels in the heuplands. Pretty neat place.

I never did get back into the vegetation at Grover's: there were black and forester's terns from a distance.

The great blue herons were not on the island colony at Hottes Lake,
