

THE BIRD OF THE WEEK AND MAYBE
THE YEAR IS A MAGNIFICENT
FRIGATESBIRD AT CLEAR LAKE IN
CENTRAL IOWA. IT WAS FIRST OBSERVED
ON SATURDAY SEPT 24, AND HAS BEEN
SEEN EACH DAY SINCE INCLUDING
TODAY THE 26TH. ON THE 25TH IT WAS
SEEN NEAR GRANDVIEW POINT WHICH IS
VISIBLE FROM THE END OF BAYSIDE
ST. ALONG THE SOUTH SHORE AND
ALSO FROM CLEAR LAKE STATE PARK
AT THE S.E. CORNER OF THE LAKE. IT
WAS OBSERVED TO ROOST IN A DEAD SWAL
ON GRANDVIEW POINT ON THE NIGHT OF
THE 25TH. ON MONDAY THE 26TH IT
WAS SEEN ALONG THE NORTH SHORE OF THE
EAST HALF OF THE LAKE. IT WAS SLOWLY
DRIFTING ALONG THE SHORELINE AT
TREETOP LEVEL OR HIGHER. IT IS A
VERY LARGE BIRD WHICH RARELY FLAPS
ITS WINGS; AND IS PRESUMED TO BE A
FEMALE BECAUSE OF THE WHITE NECK
& HEAD MARKINGS. PROBABLY THE BEST
WAY TO LOOK FOR THE BIRD IS TO GO TO
ONE OF THE PUBLIC ACCESS AREAS WHICH
ARE MARKED BY BLUE SIGNS OR TO A PARK
AREA AND SCAN THE SKYLINE ALONG THE

Shore. WHEN THE BIRD IS LOCATED PROCEED ALONG THE N OR S. SHORE DRIVES AND HEAD FOR ANY LANDMARKS SUCH AS WATER TOWERS THAT WERE SEEN WHEN SCANNING. UNTIL YOU GET CLOSE TO THE BIRD. GOOD SPOTS FOR SCANNING ARE THE END OF BAYSIDE OF THE SOUTH, CLEAR LAKE S.P. ON THE SE, CLEAR LAKE CITY PARK ON THE E AND THE STATE FISH HATCHERY ON THE N. IF THE WIND SWITCHES TO THE NORTH IT WOULD SEEM LOGICAL THAT THE BIRD MIGHT BE MORE LIKELY ALONG THE SOUTH SHORE HEADED INTO THE WIND. THIS IS THE FIRST VIABLE SIGHTING IN THE STATE SINCE 1904 AND IF ACCEPTED BY THE RECORDS COMMITTEE WILL BE THE THE FIRST MODERN RECORD. IT IS UNDOUBTEDLY A GIFT FROM HURRICANE GILBERT. PLEASE KEEP THE BIRDSITE INFORMED OF ANY SIGHTINGS OR FAILURES TO SEE IT. AND BE AWARE THAT 1-2 PEREGRINE FALCONS WERE SIGHTED OVER THE LAKE ON BOTH SEPT 25-26

Update

For the second time in less than a week, a very rare bird in Iowa has made an appearance. On Wed afternoon Sept 18, a very dark Jaeger - possibly a pomarine was seen at Saginaw City N. of Des Moines. It was seen from 12 N - 2:45 PM first from the dam, then from all sides of Ry Lake, Scheurer, Cherry Bl & Sand paper

The magnus probably had, but reported from Clear Lake - Cerro Gordo Co in N.C. Iowa on Sat P.M. 24TH, and was seen regularly, on P.M. 25TH & 26TH - on P.M. 25TH ~~the~~ usually along the South shore & on P.M. 26TH along the North Shore. It was not located by several birders on P.M. 27TH & the 28TH until it reappeared about 5 PM after the North Shore & was observed frequently along the surface near the 3600 block of N Shore Ave

ON SEPT. 28, A POMARINE JAEGER WAS
DISCOVERED AT SAYLORVILLE RESERVOIR NORTH
OF DES MOINES. IT WAS SEEN ON BOTH
SEPT. 29 AND TODAY SEPT. 30. IT IS A
VERY DARK BROWN GULL LIKE BIRD. IT
HAS BEEN SEEN FROM VARIOUS OF THE REC-
REATION AREAS AROUND THE LAKE, FROM
THE DAM, ON THE S., LAKEVIEW ON THE W.
CHERRY CLEO ON THE E., AND SANDPIPER ON THE
N. THE BEST WAY TO SEE THE BIRD, HOW-
EVER IS TO TAKE A BOAT OUT AND LOOK FOR
THE BIRD ON THE WATER OR IF FLYING,
WATCH FOR IT TO LAND. IT CAN BE
APPROACHED TO WITHIN 10-15 FEET AND IS
ENTIRELY UNAFRAID. BIRDERS SAY THE
JAEGER IN THIS WAY BOTH ON THE 29TH + 30TH.
THE SAYLORVILLE MARINA HAS 1 FISHING
BOAT + 2 PONTOON BOATS FOR RENT. THE

29TH. THERE HAVE BEEN NO REPORTS
FROM TODAY, THE 30TH FOR AN UPDATE
ON THE FRIGATEBIRD, CALL KURT NELSON
(515) 696-5600. BE AWARE THAT 1-2⁺
PEREGRINE FALCONS HAVE BEEN REGULARLY
SEEN OVER CLEAR LAKE. + THERE HAVE BEEN
MIGRANTS, GEESE, BIRDS, + WATERFOWL AT
VENTURA MARSH AT THE WEST END OF
CLEAR LAKE, BUT BE CAREFUL THERE AS
GOOSE SEASON OPENS SAT OCT 1.

THE BIRD OF THE WEEK IS A ~~PASSERINE~~^{MAGNIFICENT FIRST SIGHT} FRIGATEBIRD WHICH WAS ~~PRESENT~~ AT CLEAR LAKE, CERRO GORGO CO. IN NORTH CENTRAL IOWA ON SUNDAY SEPT 25. IT WAS SEEN IN THE LATE MORNING SOARING NEAR AN ISLAND ALONG THE SOUTH SHORE WHICH IS INVISIBLE FROM GRANDVIEW POINT AND IN THE LATE AFTERNOON WAS OBSERVED FROM CLEAR LAKE STATE PARK ON THE SE PART OF THE LAKE. IT IS A LARGE BIRD WITH 7-8 FOOT WINGSPAN & USUALLY SOARS WITHOUT FLAPPING ITS WINGS & NEEDS SOME WIND TO DO THIS. THIS IS THE FIRST VISIBLE SIGHTING IN THE STATE SINCE 1904 & IF ACCEPTED BY THE RECORDS COMMITTEE IF YOU GO TO LOOK FOR THIS BIRD PLEASE KEEP THE BIRDLINE INFORMED AND WE WILL CONTINUE TO UPDATE ANY NEWS OF IT - DAILY IF NECESSARY.

ALSO SEEN AT CLEAR LAKE ON THE 25TH WAS A PEGASINE FALCON

In SW IOWA AT FORMERS LAKE IN FREMONT CO ON SEPT 25 WERE AN AOCET, IBIS, 3 BAD EAGLES, 2 BLACK CROWNED NIGHT HERONS AND NUMEROUS THORNBIRDS & WATER FOWL. ALSO IN FRE-

MONT CO ALONG HWY #2 JUST WEST OF WAMBONBIE PARK 38 HAWKS WERE SITTING IN A PLOWED FIELD + INCLUDED RED TAIL, ROUGH LEGGED + SWAINSONS, AND AT THE TOWERSON EXIT OF I-29 AN OSPREY OVER THE BORROW PITS

IN CENTRAL IOWA ON SEPT 21 A BLUE THROATED BLUE WARBLER WAS SEEN IN A BACKYARD AT COLO IN STORY CO. ON SEPT 24 AT RED ROCK RESERVOIR IN MARION CO 4-500 WHITE PELICANS AND AT HENDRICKSON MARSH IN SE STORY CO 14 SPECIES OF SHOREBIRD INCLUDING BB PLOVER, DOWITCHERS, + STILT SANDPIPER, ALSO CASPIAN TERNS + A WATER PIPIT. ALL THESE BIRDS WERE IN THE NW CORNER OF THE MARSH. AT GRAMMAR GROVE PARK IN MARSHALL CO FROM THE 21 THRUWHT THE 25, 6 SPECIES OF HAWKS INCLUDE A MELLIN + SWAINSON'S HAWK ALSO A PILEATED SNAKE CREEK PARK NORTH OF RIPPETT IN GREENE CO + SHEEP TAILED SPARROW, DESPITE THE FACT THE MARSH IS MOSTLY DRY

IN SE IOWA, A LARGE NUMBER OF OSPIES, AS MANY AS 10-12 WERE SEEN ALONG THE IOWA RIVER N & S OF IOWA CITY, AT THE CORALVILLE RESERVOIR & LAKE MACBRIDE AND IN JOHNSON CO. ON THE 23RD AT SUGAR BOTTOM AREA OF THE CORALVILLE RES. A BLACK CROWNED NIGHT HERON AND AT THE SANDY BEACH AREA A BB PLOVER & CASSIUS & FORSTERS TERNS & NEAR IOWA CITY 2 MERLINS ON THE 23RD.

AT ~~THE~~ CROTOR UNIT OF HOMER S.F. IN LEE CO. 9 WARBLER SPECIES INCLUDING BL. THROATED PEPPERT. PARADE, WINTER & CAROLINA WRENS & NUMEROUS WHITE THROATED SPARROWS. AT POOL #19 OF THE MISS. RIVER NEAR MONTROSE SEVERAL THOUSANDS WATERFOWL ARE PRESENT AND 25-30 CASPIAN TERNS WERE SEEN, AT THE KEOKUK DAM AFTER BURDEN (IN DIA CO) MISS RIVER SNOWBAR, ON THE 28TH THERE WERE 200 GREAT EGRETS, AN ADOCET, BB PLOVER, MANY CASSIUS TERNS & 2 COMMON TERNS.
