

THERE WAS A LOT OF WEEKEND BIRDING, MOST OF WHICH WAS ASSOCIATED WITH CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNTS. AS ALWAYS, A NUMBER OF INTERESTING BIRDS WERE SPOTTED. ALL REPORTS BUT THE VARIED THRUSH CAME FROM THESE COUNTS.

AT SPENCER  
IN THE NORTHWEST, A VARIED THRUSH HAS BEEN COMING TO THE BIRD BATH AND UNDER THE SUNFLOWER FEEDER AT THE HOME OF JIM BOCK, 814 W. 10<sup>TH</sup>. YOU CAN CALL JIM FOR <sup>MORE INFORMATION AND</sup> UPDATES AT (712) 262-6578.

In South Central Iowa, THE RED ROCK COUNT, IN MARION COUNTY HAD A MOST UNUSUAL SIGHTING OF AN EMPidonax FLYCATCHER, POSSIBLY A LEAST, WHICH WAS SEEN AND PHOTOGRAPHED AT THE KUQPET TRAIL PARKING LOT. OTHER GOOD BIRDS WERE A WESTERN GREEBE ABOVE THE DAM, A BLACK-LEGGED KITTIWAKE AT THE CLIFFS OF NORTH ELK ROCK STATE PARK, A NORTHERN MOCKINGBIRD AT HOWELL STATION, 2 FIRST WINTER GLAUCLON GULLS AND 2 FIRST WINTER THAYER'S GULLS BELOW THE DAM AND ANOTHER FIRST WINTER THAYER'S GULL IN THE WHITEBREAST AREA. AT THE EIS- RATTABUN LAKE COUNT ON THE 15<sup>TH</sup>, BETTER BIRDS WERE 2 BLACK SCOTERS AND 2 NORTHERN GREEBS JUST ABOVE THE DAM, AND LONG AND SHORT EARED ONLY.

IN THE CENTER PART OF THE STATE, THE SOUTHWEST COUNT IN POLK COUNTY WAS ON THE 16<sup>TH</sup>. AMONG THEIR MANY OUTSTANDING FINDS WERE A SWAN SPLEND,

GOLDEN EAGLE, 3 FIRST WINTER BLACK TELLIED KITTYWAKES,  
1 FIRST WINTER GLAUCOUS AND 2 FIRST WINTER  
TRAYER'S GULLS, 6 OWLS INCLUDING <sup>AND</sup> SAW WHETS,  
SNOW BUNTINGS, BLUE WINGED TEAL, GREATER SCAUP,  
MAYBE THEIR BEST BIRD ~~IS~~ WAS A TOWNSEND'S  
SOLITARE, WHICH WAS FOUND ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF  
146TH STREET NEAR THE BRIDGE ABOUT 1/4 MILE

IN THE SOUTHWEST, SHAWARDORN'S CENSUS WAS ON THE  
15TH COUNTED 56 SPECIES WITH LONG EARED OWL,  
COOPER'S HAWK, PIED BILLED GREBE, AND REDHEAD.

IN SOUTHEAST IOWA, BURLINGTON'S TOTAL ON THE  
15TH TIED THEIR RECORD OF 71 SPECIES WITH  
WHITE PELICAN, NORTHERN MOCKINGBIRD, AND 11 EASTERN  
TREE SPARROWS. FOR MORE INFORMATION ON THE TREE

IOWA CITY'S COUNT ON THE 16TH HAD 68 SPECIES,  
SHATTERING THEIR OLD RECORD OF 63. THEIR GOOD BIRDS  
WERE A FRANKLIN'S GULL IN ALTERNATE PLUMAGE,  
WINTER WREN, YELLOW RUMPED WARBLER, AND 6  
OWL SPECIES INCLUDING LONG EARED, SHORT EARED,

MISSED A FIRST WINTER GLAUCOUS GULL SEEN ON
