ON OCT 6<sup>TH</sup>, 5 SHARP TAILED SPARROWS ALONG THE MAN DIXIE, 40  
WHITE-FRONTED GEESE, 7 FORSTER'S TERNS, A VERY LATE  
BLACK TERN, A BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERON, 10 SORA,  
10 GREAT EGRETS, A NORTHERN HARRIER, A SHARP  
SHINNED HAWK AND LINCOLN'S SPARROWS. AT THE  
COPPERWIRE REPOSITORY IN TOLSON COUNTY, AT THE  
END OF THE BABLOCK RUEED ROAD ON THE 6<sup>TH</sup> AND 7<sup>TH</sup>  
WHITE PECTORAL, FRANKLIN'S GULL, CASPIAN TERN,  
<sup>SANDERLING, BAIRD'S SANDPIPER</sup>  
DUNLIN, ~~THE~~ LONG BILLED DOWITCHERS, ~~AND~~  
~~HARRIS'S SPARROW;~~ ~~AND~~ BLACK BELIED PLOVERS,  
AND A HARRIS'S SPARROW. A BLACK CROWNED  
NIGHT HERON WAS JUST SOUTH OF THE DU PONT  
BRIDGE, A FEMALE BLACK THROATED BLUE WARBLER  
WAS AT THE JONES RIVER AREA ON THE 6<sup>TH</sup> AND  
A PIGEON FALCON WAS SEEN WHERE HIGHWAY  
965 CROSSES THE RIVERWORK ON THE 6<sup>TH</sup>

TO THE NORTH, CENTRAL TOWNS, CURT NELSON <sup>REPORTS</sup>  
THAT HE HAS A 40 ACRE ~~STRETCH~~ FIELD, <sup>ON HIS PROPERTY</sup> ON THE  
NORTH EDGE OF MASSES CITY WITH 12 SPECIES OF  
SPARROWS PRESENT, INCLUDING SHARP TAILED, LECONTES,

WAS REPORTED FROM THE BEACH ~~OR~~ OR  
SANDPIPE RIVER AREA AT THE STATIONHOUSE &  
THIS WOULD BE A SECOND STATE RECORD

PREVIOUSLY REPORTED BIRDS, CALIFORNIA GULL, IN PARK COUNTY, YELLOW RAIL IN GREENE COUNTY, AND SCISSOR-TAILED FLYCATCHER IN MONROE COUNTY WERE STILL BEING SEEN, AND HIGHLIGHT THE WEEK'S ~~END~~ REPORT

IN THE CENTRAL PART OF THE STATE, THE YELLOW RAIL WAS SEEN IN THE SAME SPOT AT SNAKE CREEK MARSH, IT HAS BEEN FLUSHED THE PAST 2 WEEKENDS. TO LOOK FOR THIS BIRD, GO NORTH OF RIPPETT ABOUT A MILE AND A HALF ON GREENE COUNTY ROAD P-46. TURN EAST ON GRAVEL ABOUT A HALF MILE TO A PARKING LOT ON THE NORTH SIDE OF THE ROAD. WALK THE MOWED PATH TO THE NORTHWEST, AND WHERE IT TURNS SOUTH LOOK FOR A YELLOW RIBBON ON THE LEFT HAND SIDE OF THE PATH. TIM SCHWARTZ WAS KNOB ENOUGH TO PLACE THE RIBBON WHERE HE FLUSHED THE BIRD ON SATURDAY OCTOBER 7<sup>TH</sup>. ALSO SEEN HERE WERE NUMEROUS SHARP TAILED AND LE CONTE'S SPARROWS, SOOTS AND VIRGINIA PASSES, AN AMERICAN BITTERN AND BLACK CROWNED NIGHT HERON; SWAINSON'S HAWK, HOGGERHEAD SHRIKE AND 2 NORTHERN HARRIERS.

AT THE SAVIORVILLE RESERVOIR, AT THE BEACH OF SAVIOR RECREATION AREA, THE ADULT CALIFORNIA GULL WAS SEEN AGAIN WITH RING BILLED LAYS ABOUT 5:30 PM ON FRIDAY THE 5<sup>TH</sup>. OTHER BIRDS THERE WERE HERRING, BONAPARTE'S AND FLAMINGO GULLS AND CASPIAN TERN,<sup>BY THE 4<sup>TH</sup>, THEREFORE 5<sup>TH</sup> AMERICAS PLATEAU</sup> SAND PIPER IS CLOSED FOR THE SEASON, AND YOU MUST DRIVE THROUGH THE MOUNDS TO THE FAR

THIS UPDATE WILL ONLY INCLUDE NEWS OF THE RARE BIRDS AND A NEW COMPLETE REPORT WILL BE PRESENTED TOMORROW

LATE THIS MORNING, SUNDAY OCTOBER 14, A SPAR-TAILED SANDPIPER WAS DISCOVERED AT THE CORALVILLE RESERVOIR. TO LOOK FOR THIS BIRD, TAKE EXIT 4 ON I-380 AND GO WEST ON JEFFERSON COUNTY ROAD F-28 FOR 3 $\frac{1}{2}$  MILES, THEN NORTH ON GRAVEL 1 $\frac{1}{2}$  MILES, THEN WEST AND LOOK IN WET AREAS ON THE NORTH SIDE OF THE ROAD AFTER A HALF MILE OR CALL TOM KENT FOR MORE INFORMATION AT (319) 337-5231. THIS MAY BE A FIRST STATE RECORD FOR THIS BIRD.

LATE ON SATURDAY AFTERNOON, A NEW GULL WAS SEEN WITH RING BILLERS AT THE BEACH OF SANDPIPER RECREATION AREA AT THE SAVORYVILLE RESERVOIR IN POLK COUNTY. THIS WOULD BE A SECOND STATE RECORD. THE SANDPIPER AREA IS CLOSED FOR THE SEASON, SO YOU MUST DRIVE THROUGH THE MARINA TO THE FAR END OF THE PARKING LOT AND WALK IN FROM THERE. THE ADULT CALIFORNIA GULL WAS SEEN THERE ALSO ON THE 12<sup>TH</sup> AND JUST NORTH OF THE JESTER PARK BOAT LAUNCH ON THE 13<sup>TH</sup>.

ELSEWHERE IN CENTRAL TOWNS AT OAK GROVE RECREATION  
AREA BEING, A SPARROW AND A FLYING SWALLOW  
HAWK ON THE 4<sup>TH</sup>, IN WESTERN GRUNDY COUNTY, AN  
IMMATURE GOLDEN EAGLE WAS OBSERVED, AND 55  
LESSER GOLDEN PLOVER WERE IN A BEAN STUBBLE FIELD,  
BOTH ON THE 6<sup>TH</sup>; AND 47 RED TAILED PLANTED OVER  
GRAMMER GROVE PARK IN MARSHALL COUNTY ON THE  
7<sup>TH</sup>.

HIGHWAY 5 NORTH OF LOUISVILLE. THE BIRDS ARE ALSO SEEN  
ALONG THE RAILROAD TRACKS BEHIND HER HOME. EVELYN  
KNOWS TRACK OF THE BIRDS, SO STOP AT HER HOME FIRST.

ON THE 3<sup>RD</sup>. AT THE RUNNELS WILDLIFE AREA ON  
THE 6<sup>TH</sup> AND 7<sup>TH</sup> LOTS OF BIRDS INCLUDING 3500  
WHITE PELICANS, 150 GREAT BLUE HERONS, 75 GREATER CORMORANTS,  
100 WHITE-FRONTED GESE, 7 WATERFOWL SPECIES IN-  
CLUDING LESSER SCAUP, 2 IMMATURE BALD EAGLES, 8  
SHOREBIRD SPECIES, INCLUDING 5000 SANDPIPER AND 39  
LONG-BILLED POWITCHERS, CASPIAN TERN, COOPER'S HAWK,  
2 MERLINS AND 2 PEREGRINE FALCONS.
