Iowa Birdline (319)338-9881 for October 22 THERE WERELARGE NUMBERS OF Blutsings and Waterfowl have started to spread into the state, and there is now a raft of diving ducks at the Saylorville Reservoir. This is the time to start looking for the odd waterfowl, such as scoters, grebes, loons, and oldsquaw. The CALIFORNIA GULL in Polk County, the MUTE SWAN in Marion County, and the SCISSOR-TAILED FLYCATCHER in Monroe County are still being reported, but we have had no news the past week regarding the SHARP-TAILED SANDPIPER in Johnson County, or the MEW GULL in Polk County.

> In the South-central, the juvenile MUTE SWAN was still present through the 21rst on a small lake which is located about a mile north of the Red Rock dam where Marion County Road T-15 goes toward Pella. A MERLIN was also seen near that location on the 19th. Also in Marion County, a large gull concentration, which includes FRANKLIN'S and BONAPARTE'S, was found along hiway 14 north of Knoxville in the Whitebreast Creek area. On the 20th there were also BLACK-BELLIED and LESSER GOLDEN PLOVER, as well as LAPLAND LONGSPURS at that location. The adult SCISSOR-TAILED FLYCATCHER was present at least through the 20th around the residence of Evelyn Wright, which is the first house on the east side of hiway 5 north of Lovilla. You can call Evelyn for updates at (515)946-7914. Beth Brown has a CAROLINA WREN at her home at the east edge of Osceola. At the Runnells Wildlife Area, there are good numbers of waterfowl, some shorebirds, still some GREAT EGRETS, and GREAT BLUE HERONS, and BALD EAGLES.

> In central Iowa at the Saylorville Reservoir in Polk County, the winter adult CALIFORNIA GULL was seen again on the 18th at the beach of Sandpiper Recreation Area. Other birds observed there on the 20th and 21rst were FRANKLIN'S and BONAPARTE'S GULLS, a CASPIAN TERN, a late BUFF-BREASTED SANDPIPER, SANDERLINGS, BAIRD'S SANDPIPER, BLACK-BELLIED PLOVER, and a flock of about 20 AMERICAN PIPITS. The road to

Sandpiper is closed for the season, so you must drive through the marina to the far end of the parking lot, and walk in from there. Elsewhere at Saylorville, the season's first sighting of SNOW BUNTING came from the far west pullout on top of the dam, and an EARED GREBE was just above the dam, both on the 21rst. A WESTERN GREBE was on the lake on the 18th, and a SMITH'S LONGSPUR was sighted at the beach of Oak Grove Recreation Area on the 18th. You must walk in to Oak Grove from Cherry Glen. The first SHORT-EARED OWL report of the fall came from Big Creek State Park, where the bird was seen in cedars north of the end of 100th Street on the 21rst. In Boone County, a late CATBIRD was at the Ledges State Park on the 20th, and in Madison County, 12 sparrow species, including LECONTE'S, were at Badger Creek State Park on the 21rst. In Johnson County, at Hickory Hill Park in Iowa City, SHARP-SHINNED and ROUGH-LEGGED HAWKS, EASTERN PHOEBE and 6 sparrow species, including HARRIS' on the 21rst. CAROLINA WRENS had been reported from 3 separate locations in Iowa City in the past week. Jim Fuller (319)338-3561
