Besides a PARTRIDGE IN A PEAR TREE, the week's highlights are COMMON and HOARY REDPOLLS, BLACK-BILLED MAGPIE, OLDSQUAW in the northwest, BARROW'S GOLDENEYE, GLAUCOUS, THAYER'S, and LESSER BLACK-BACKED GULLS, BLACK-LEGGED KITTIWAKE, and OLDSQUAW in the southeast, TOWNSEND'S SOLITAIRE in Common REPAIL W the southwest, and RED CROSSBILL, and COMMON REDPOLL in the northeast. The SNOWY OWL in Marshall County has not been seen now since the 16th.

In the northwest in Dickinson County on the 23rd, Lee Schoenewe studied one bird in a flock of fifty COMMON REDPOLLS at the state fish hatchery at Spirit Lake, that he felt was a HOARY REDPOLL. Fore more information, call Lee at (712)262-8194. The BLACK-BILLED MAGPIE was reported omce again in Plymouth County on the 17th. For details and location, call Bill Huser at (402)494-1657, or Randy Williams at (712)276-3618. At Cherokee, a female OLDSQUAW has been at Spring Lake on the south edge of town since November. Matt Kenne reported on the 18th that what may be a first record of NORTHERN MOCKINGBIRD for Kossuth County that has been coming to a waterer at a farmstead west of Algona since December 1rst.

In the southeast in Lee County on the 18th, a male BARROW'S GOLDENEYE was discovered on the Keokuk Christmas Count on the Mississippi River at the south edge of Montrose. This bird was not relocated among the thousands of COMMON GOLDENEYES, COMMON MERGANSERS, and CANVASBACKS, but on the 20th three OLDSQUAWS and a first-year GLAUCOUS GULL were there. Other good birds on the Keokuk count included a BLACK-LEGGED KITTIWAKE just above Lock & Dam #19, M KEANUK, RUFOUS-SIDED TOWHEE, NORTHERN MOCKINGBIRD, and NORTHERN SHRIKE. In Scott County on the Mississippi River on the 24th, a first-year THAYER'S GULL and an adult LESSER BLACK-BACKED GULL were at Lock & Dam #14, and nine GREATER SCAUP, of which seven were females, were at Princeton. In Marion County on the 21rst, a first-year THAYER'S GULL was below the Red Rock Reservoir Dam, and a first-year GLAUCOUS GULL was just above the Dollar Bridge, which is three miles downstream from the Red Rock dam.

In the southwest in Pottawattamie County, the TOWNSEND'S SOLITAIRE continued to be seen south of Council Bluffs, at least through the 21rst. The location is reached by going a quarter mile north from the intersection of hiways 275 and 370, and then east on Applewood Road for three-quarters to a mile.

In the northeast in Winneshiek County, the Decorah Christmas Count came up with a record 55 species on the 23rd, with HERMIT THRUSH, RED CROSSBILL, COMMON REDPOLL, YELLOW-RUMPED WARBLER, KILLDEER, RUSTY BLACKBIRD, and EASTERN BLUEBIRD.
