The highlights this week are FULVOUS WHISTLING DUCK in Clinton County, PACIFIC LOON in Hamilton County, and BLACK and KING RAILS in Kossuth County.

In the east-central in Clinton County on the 17th, Steve Dinsmore discovered a FULVOUS WHISTLING DUCK at Goose Lake in mid-afternoon, but it could not be relocated late in the day. From hiway 136 about a mile west of the town of Goose Lake, go north on 350th Avenue for a half mile, and then turn east into the lane to the marsh. The bird was sitting on a muskrat lodge on the south side of the dike about three-quarters of the way toward the east end. Also seen there were SADNHILL CRANES, COMMON MOORHENS, and AMERICAN and LEAST BITTERNS.

In the central in Hamilton County, the basic-plumaged PACIFIC LOON discoverd on the 13th at Anderson Lake just east of Jewell, was still being seen on the 17th. Walk along the south side of the lake along the railroad tracks, and look north. In Polk County, two families of WESTERN KINGBIRDS were on the state capitol grounds at Des Moines on the 17th.

In the north-central in Kossuth County, BLACK, KING, and VIRGINIA RAILS were seen at Stateline Marsh on the 12th. The King and Virginia RAILs, as well as Least Bittern and BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERON were seen there on the north side of the blacktop on the 17th, but the BLACK RAIL which was seen at the east edge of the water on the south side of the road was not found later in the week. This location is a mile south of the Minnesota border along county road A-16, about two miles west of its intersection with P-30.

In the southeast, across the Mississippi River from Lee County, two SNOWY EGRETS were at a wildlife area along hiway 96 south of Nauvoo, Illinois, on the 13th. In Des Moines

County, seven CATLLE EGRETS were with livestock in a farm field about seven miles north of Burlington on the 16th.

In the west in Monona County, three families of COMMON MOORHENS, including five young birds in one of the groups, plus two SNOW GEESE were at South Blue Lake on the 14th. Jim Fuller (319)338-3561
