The highlights were WHITE-WINGED and BLACK SCOTERS and LESSER BLACK-BACKED GULL, all at Red Rock, HUDSONIAN GODWIT in Iowa County, LAUGHING GULL in the southwest, and SANDHILL CRANES in

Field trips at the IOU meeting at Pella over the weekend produced 113 species, including 2 WHITE-WINGED SCOTERS, a male and female BLACK SCOTER, 6 HORNED GREBES, up to 6 COMMON LOONS, and a second year LESSER BLACK-BACKED GULL on Red Rock Reservoir, and a RED-SHOULDERED HAWK below the Red Rock dam. At the north end of Roberts Creek Lake, the shorebirds included DUNLIN and LONG-BILLED DOWITCHER, and there were AMERICAN PIPITS there as well. Other good birds were SNOW BUNTING, LAPLAND LONGSPUR, LECONTE'S SPARROW, and COMMON MOORHEN, which was at Lake Rathbun. Elsewhere in the south-central in Appanoose County, there were three COMMON LOONS, eleven HORNED GREBES, four HOODED MERGANSERS, and AMERICAN PIPITS at Lake Rathbun on the 30th.

In the southeast, a bird not only unusual in the fall, but on a record late date was the HUDSONIAN GODWIT at the Amana Lily Lake bewteen Main and Middle Amana on the 30th. Also seen there were seven othert shorebird species, including DUNLIN, LONG-BILLED DOWITCHER, and WESTERN SANDPIPER. In Johnson County, six LONG-BILLED DOWITCHERS were at Swan Lake, and a SNOW BUNTING was along Greencastle Avenue at the Coralville Reservoir on the 29th.
