On the 26th in the northeast in Allamakee County, two immature GOLDEN EAGLES were seen over the Upper Iowa River bluffs along county road A-26, just a half mile west of hiway 26, and in Clayton County a NORTHERN SHRIKE was spotted just west of Guttenberg. In Linn County, a SHORT-EARED OWL was along the Sac & Fox Trail where it runs along Otis Road in Cedar Rapids, and at the Goose Pond Natural Area in the Lewis Bottoms, a NORTHERN SHRIKE and FOX SPARROW were found.
