The highlights this week include news of COMMON BLACK-HEADED GULL in the northwest, HOODED WARBLER and MISSISSIPPI KITE in the central, and SNOWY EGRET in the southeast.

In the northwest in Dickinson County, the adult COMMON BLACK-HEADED GULL was seen again on the 16th at the wetland just north of Jemmerson Slough. To reach this area, go north of hiway 9 on hiway 86 for about a mile, and then turn east on 140th Street proceeding 2.8 miles, and look on the north side of the road. In Pocahontas County, an OSPREY was spotted at Luther's Lake on the the 15th.

19 15th In the central in Warren County, the HOODED WARBLER was still singing on the 15th along the trail which runs along the west side of Lake Ahquabi, near where it intersects with a trail to Camp Wesley Woods. In Boone County, the nest of the MISSISSIPPI KITES in the lower area of the Ledges State Park was evidently blown down in a storm last week, The kites were still in the area on the 17th, however. In Madison County, a pair of LEAST BITTERNs has taken up residence on the farm pond of Eugene and Eloise Armstrong, who live south of Booneville. You can reach the Armstrongs for more information at (515)996-2726. In Story County, a NORTHERN MOCKINGBIRD was sighted on the 17th at the north edge of Ames, where the Skunk River bends close to hiway 69.

In the southeast in Des Moines County, a SNOWY EGRET was a flyover at Casey-Barrow Access to the Mississipi River, about ten miles north of Burlington, on the 17th.
