IN THE SOUTHWEST IN APPANOOSE COUNTY, AMONG THE SHOREBIRDS AND GULLS AT THE CLOSED BOAT RAMP ON THE PENINSULA AT LAKE PATAHOU, WAS A PIPING PLOVER, AND IN IOWA COUNTY, A CADIAN FLYCATCHER AND VEERY WERE SEEN ALONG THE AMANA NATURE TRAIL AT HOMESTERO.

In the central in Hamilton County, a RED-NECKED GREBE in basic plumage was found at Anderson Lake on the 4th and 6th. From the town of Jewell, go east on hiway 175, and after passing the south end of the lake, go north on the first gravel road, and park. Walk west along the railroad tracks, and look for the bird to the south. Be patient, as it is hard to find, staying hidden in the reeds most of the time. The four TRUMPETER SWANS at Anderson Lake were released there in the past two weeks.

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
