The north winds have lasted almost two weeks, but with the switch this past weekend, things may begin to happen again in the spring migration. The week's best birds are OLDSQUAW and RED-THROATED LOON in the northeast, PACIFIC LOON in the northwest, and CINNAMON TEAL in the southeast.

In the northeast in Linn County, a male OLDSQUAW was found at Pleasant Creek Recreation Area north of Palo on the 26th, and the RED-THROATED LOON first discovered there on the 13th, was still being seen at least through the 25th. In Butler County, two BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERONS and eight shorebird species, including DUNLIN were at Big Marsh on the 23rd. In Winneshiek County, five SANDHILL CRANES were flyovers at Cardinal Marsh on the 24th.

In the northwest in Dickinson County, the PACIFIC LOON, first reported on the 13th was still being seen in North Bay at West Okoboji Lake through the 24th.

In the southeast in Des Moines County, a CINNAMON TEAL was being seen at least through the 24th. Just north of Burlington, take Tama Road east off hiway 99, and in less than a mile near the first bridge look in the flooded field to the right. EURASIAN TREE SPARROWS are easy to find by taking the first left off Tama Road and looking in the first 200 yards. In Louisa County, three SANDHILL CRANES were seen at Cone Marsh on the 23rd. In Johnson County, YELLOW-THROATED WARBLER and NORTHERN PARULA were singing last week at the entrance to the Cottage Reserve Area at MacBride State Park. At the Hawkeye Wildlife Area, an AMERICAN BITTERN was along the east side of Greencastle Avenue on the 25th, and a NORTHERN MOCKINGBIRD was seen west of a parking lot along the west side of James Avenue, a half mile north of the Swan Lake Road on the 27th. In lowa County, at least two UPLAND SANDPIPERS have returned to their traditional nesting area along SS Avenue south of hiway 6, about three m iles west of Homestead.

In the central in Tama County, at Otter Creek Marsh, SANDHILL CRANES were observed almost daily last week, with the largest number reported as seven on the 25th. Also seen there on the 26th and 27th were AMERICAN BITTERN, BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERON, VIRGINIA RAIL, SORA, GREAT-TAILED GRACKLE, and HORNED GREBE. In Story County, three WILLETS were at Hendrickson Marsh on the 27th, and along Squaw Creek in Ames, two BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERONS were spotted on the 27th.
